Will Lecture About Ocean

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—"The Sea and the Life Within It" will be the subject for a series of two lectures to be given on the University of Oregon campus February 9 and 11 by a distinguished oceanographer and educator, Dr. Ralph Buchsbaum.

Dr. Buchsbaum will give the two talks that will comprise the 1954 Condon Lectures, a series sponsored annually by the Oregon state board of higher education and given each year on the University campus in Eugene, on the Oregon State college campus in Corvallis, and at Portland State college in Portland. The series will start this year with the two in Eugene. These will be repeated in Corvallis on February 16 and 18, and in Portland on February 23 and 24.

The lectures here will be given in the Erb Memorial Union ballroom at 8 o'clock each evening. In Corvallis the lectures will be in the Home Economics auditorium at 8 p.m., and in Portland at the college auditorium, 1620 S. W. Park Ave., at 8 p.m.

Dr. Buchsbaum, who is currently on the staff of the University of Pittsburgh, will divide his topic into a discussion of the early ideas and misconceptions of the sea for the first lecture, and the newer techniques of oceanography for the second talk.

Dr. Ralph Buchsbaum, distinguished oceanographer, educator, and author, will be the 1954 Condon lecturer. He will give a series of six lectures in the state, the first two at the University of Oregon on February 9 and 11, then two at Oregon State College on February 16 and 18, and the final two at Portland State College on February 23 and 24.

Fair Weather Reigns in U.S.

There were a few cold spots, Northern New England, the Northern Great Lakes region and in sections of the Rockies. Legend has it that there'll be six more weeks of cold weather if the ground hog sees his shadow. If he doesn't winter is on the way out.

But it was like winter in Maine and New Hampshire Tuesday with sub-zero readings. One of the lowest marks was 9 degrees below zero at Houlton, Maine.

Only a few wet spots were reported. Light snow fell in Southern New England. Light showers hit sections of Kentucky, Texas and Washington. There was fog west of the Rockies, with the heaviest reported in the Northwestern states.

Temperatures Monday ranged from a high of 89 at Thermal, Calif., to 12 above at Caribou, Maine.

Demo Chief Due In Seattle Feb. 9

WASHINGTON (AP)—Stephen A. Mitchell, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, will be in Seattle Feb. 9 for a series of conferences with party officials. Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said Tuesday.

Mitchell is on a two week tour which will take him to nine Western states and will include speeches in Portland Feb. 10, Baker, Ore., Feb. 11 and Helena, Mont., Feb. 12, Magnuson said.

The senator said Mitchell will "stress the need for strong candidates and better organization" in the party conferences.

"Mitchell is convinced the Democrats can win from three to five additional seats in the four Northwest states," Magnuson declared.
