



UNIVERSITY OF OREGON. UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—"The Sea and the Life Within It" will be the subject for a series of two lec-tures to be given on the Univer-sity of Oregon campus February 9 and 11 by a distinguished oceanographer and educator, Dr. Ralph Buchsbaum.

Dr. Buchsbaum will give the two talks that will comprise the 1954 Condon Lectures, a series sponsored annually by the Ore-gon state board of higher education and given each year on the University campus in Eugene, on the Oregon State college camon the Oregon State college can pus in Corvallis, and at Portland State college in Portland. The series will start this year with the two in Eugene. These will be repeated in Corvallis on Febru-ary 16 and 18, and in Portland on February 23 and 24 on February 23 and 24.

The lectures here will be giv-en in the Erb Memorial Union ballroom at 8 o'clock each eve ning. In Corvallis the lectures will be in the Home Economics autilitorium at 8 p.m., and in Portland at the college auditor-ium, 1620 S. W. Park Ave., at 8 p.m.

Dr. Buchsbaum, who is correct-ly on the staff of the University of Pittsburgh, will divide his topic into a discussion of the early LINCOLN, Neb.
