CHICAGO (U—) — Producers cut back shipments of hogs Tuesday and the market responded by gaining around 25 cents on butchers and 50 cents on sows. A double deck of choice 190 to 210 pound butchers sold at \$26.75, the top, with buyers paying \$26.25 to \$26.65 for most choice 180 to 200 pound butchers. Choice and prime steers brought \$25.00 to \$29.65. Slaughter lambs were weak to 25 cents lower. Good and choice types eased to \$19.75 to \$20.75. Salable receipts were estimated at 7,000 hogs, 6,000 cattle, 400 calves and 4,000 sheep.

Wall Street

NEW YORK (U—) — A quiet decline Tuesday took the stock market down slightly. At the most the decline went to between 1 and 2 points, but small minus signs were the rule. At the same time, many plus signs dotted the list. Volume on the fall was down materially to an estimated 1,400,000 shares. That compares with 1,740,000 shares traded Monday.
