

Bochsler-Buchholz Rites At St. Mary's Saturday

MOUNT ANGEL—At a ceremony in the St. Mary's Catholic church here Saturday morning, January 30, Miss Marcine Irene Buchholz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Buchholz, was wed to Lawrence E. Bochler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bochler. The Rev. Clement Frank, O.S.B., officiated at the 10 o'clock double ring ceremony and nuptial high mass in the presence of a large gathering of relatives and friends. Serving as altar boys were Tommy Bochler and Jerry Bochler, cousin and nephew of the bridegroom.

The church was decorated with large baskets of daffodils and acacia with greenery, and similar flowers with tall lighted tapers adorning the altars. The St. Mary's church choir sang, and Miss Helen Keber was organist. Eugene Ray of Portland sang before the ceremony and again preceding the recessional while the couple knelt at the Blessed Virgin altar.
