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## Shipments of Lumber Gained

**PORTLAND** — The Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau reported Monday that the West Coast shipped 11.7 per cent more lumber by sea last year than in 1952.

Figures covered shipments from Northern California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. The 1953 total was slightly more than 3 1/2 billion board feet compared with a little less than 3 billion in 1952.

The largest gain, 105 per cent, was reported by Northern California with a total of 94 million board feet.

British Columbia showed a gain of 21.2 per cent, mostly due to shipments to eastern U. S. ports. The British Columbia total was 1,391,664,206 feet.

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
