Ham and Lettuce Sandwiches

Pear Custard

**Pear Custard**  
Ingredients: 2 cups water 3/4 cup nonfat dry milk powder, 1/4 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 8 canned pear halves (well drained and dried).

Method: Pour water into top of double boiler. Mix nonfat dry milk powder, sugar and salt, sprinkle over surface of water; beat with rotary beater until blended. Cover. Place over hot water and seal. Beat eggs slightly; heat a little of the hot mixture into eggs; blend back into 6 custard cups. Place cups in baking pan; fill pan with warm water to depth of 1 inch. Bake in slow (300 F.) oven about 1 hour and 15 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Remove at once from water bath; cool.
