The Cougars, who dimmed Idaho's pennant hopes with an upset victory last week, put league leading Oregon on their "kill" hook Wednesday night, 74-68. It gave them a split in two games here and put the Ducks back where they started the series—one game ahead of Oregon State in the tight pennant chase.

Friday and Saturday WSC plays Oregon State at Corvallis. With Udaho favored over last place Washington in games at Seattle the same nights, a WSC-OSC split would further scramble the race for division honors.

Halbrook Accuracy Rates 2nd

LOS ANGELES — Oregon State's towering center, Wade Halbrook, who has the scoring race all to himself, also is pushing to the top of the marksmanship column, according to week-ly basketball statistics released today by the Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner's office.

Halbrook scored 59 field goals in his first eight Conference out-ings and hit 61 free throws for a total of 179 points and a 23.4 game average. Meanwhile he has closed the gap on Oregon's pace setting Ed Halberg in the per-centage column. Halberg has hit 40 of 77 field goal tries for 52 per cent while Halbrook is sec-ond-ranked with 48.3 per cent on 59 goals in 122 attempts. Oregon Center Max Anderson is third, Taken by Troy 47.5 per cent.

Oregon leads in team shooting with 38.5% from the floor while Oregon State has shot 37.9%. Idaho is top-ranked from the free throw line with 64.2% and has the highest scoring team with 63.5 per game. Oregon State has allowed the fewest points, 54.5, and Oregon the lowest percentage on shots, 30.6%
