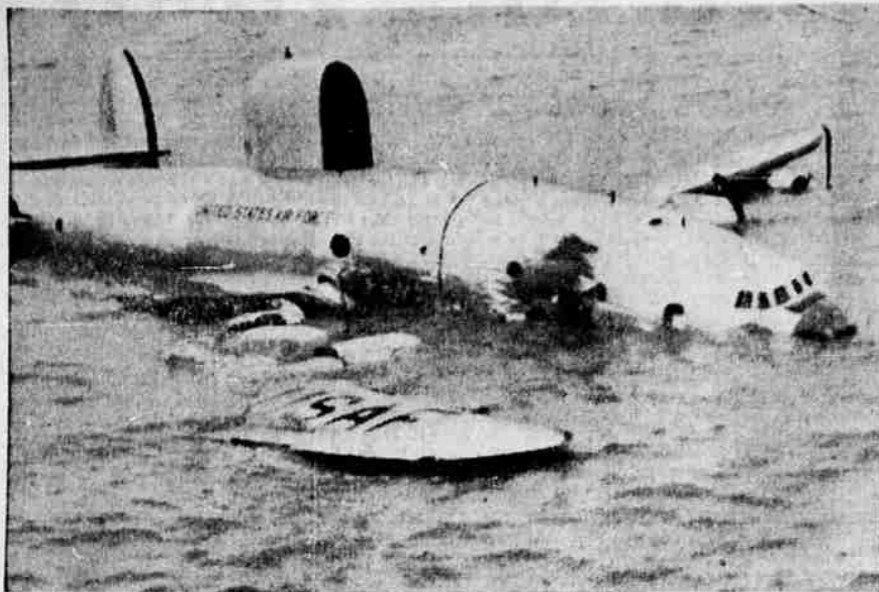


FLYING LAB CRASHES IN BAY

Brownell Avers Report On White Shoved Aside

WASHINGTON — Atty. Gen. Brownell says justice department lawyers are combing through 20,000 lost documents, one of which has already led to the explosive Harry Dexter White case for possible follow-ups against other persons named in them.

When the Republicans came to power last year, Brownell told CBS television interviewers Sunday, they found a lot of papers in the justice department that had never been properly recorded or studied "but had just been tossed in the desk drawer."

Because of one housecleaning order, "20,000 lost documents were turned up," Brownell said, and "some of them were of extreme importance" including the now-famed 1945 FBI report on Soviet spying in the United States.

"We found a great many evidences of slipshod work when we came in," Brownell said on a CBS television interview yesterday. He said the report on White had evidently been "shoved in a drawer" without evaluation.

In a Nov. 6 speech, Brownell said former President Truman promoted White early in 1946 in the face of an FBI report indicating that he was under investigation as a Russian spy.

Threatener at Silverton Not Yet Quieted

SILVERTON — Silverton's anonymous threatener of violence was at it again Wednesday, the Marion county sheriff's office reported Thursday.

The calls included a warning that the Silverton branch of the First National Bank was going to be held up, that the Main Jewelry store was going to be held up and, two false fire alarms.

The two threatened hold-ups calls came in the middle of the afternoon.

Manager J. Casey Moore of the bank, said the anonymous caller said, "You're going to be held up tonight," and then hung up.

At about the same time, Mrs. John Main called police to tell of a similar call at the jewelry store.

About 15 minutes later the first false alarm was called in for the fire department and about 3:15 another false alarm was placed.

Recently the town was thrown into an uproar when a series of calls to citizens warned them to draw plenty of water because the city reservoir was going to be blown up that night.

Officers said the calls are apparently the work of a juvenile with a morbid sense of humor or of a crank. City, county and state police are still investigating, however.

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Dr. Phelps Rites Held Monday

DALLAS — Funeral services for Dr. Charles Ezra Phelps, 73, who died of a heart attack Thursday, February 4, were held at 2 p. m. Monday, February 8 from the First Presbyterian church in Dallas.

Dr. Phelps had been a physician in Dallas since 1936 coming here from Portland where he had been for 13 years. He had previously been in Hartley, Iowa, where he went following his graduation from medical school at Philadelphia, Pa., in 1907. He was born Feb. 2, 1881 at Waterloo, Iowa.

Survivors include his wife, Winifred; one son, Charles P. Phelps, Richmond, Calif., one daughter, Mrs. Shirley Joan Phelps Michelson, Lebanon; a sister, Mrs. Louise Kieffer, Pasadena, Calif.; a brother, Dr. Dexter Phelps, Waterloo, Iowa; and a grandson, Richard Charles Michelson, Lebanon.

Dr. Phelps was a member of the First Presbyterian church of Dallas of Jennings Lodge A. F. and A. M.; Ainsworth chapter Royal Arch Masons, of Dallas, Al Kader temple of the Shrine, Portland. He was past president (1932) of the Homopathist society.

Miners Agree To Election

BUTTE, Mont. — Negotiations for a consent election between warring factions of the Butte miners' union No. 1 will open Thursday under a National Labor Relations Board field examiner.

Examiner Howard Hilburn is expected here to seek a settlement of the controversy between members of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers and a United Steel Workers of America (CIO) group, which bolted Mine-Mill Dec. 27.

Ernest Salvas, Butte administrator for Mine-Mill said 700 miners attended a Mine-Mill meeting Sunday and voted to circulate petition urging an immediate NLRB election.

The steel workers' group withdrew from the IUMM&SW in protest at what it described as Communist leanings in Mine - Mill leadership.

Story Told of 1st Fruit Trees

SILVERTON — With the August 4-8, 1954, Silverton Centennial being popularly discussed and advertised abroad, J. D. Drake historian, and photographer, is contributing a story on the first fruit trees to be planted and developed in this community.

Several days ago Mr. Drake told the story of the first wheat grown in Oregon. This was verified historically.

Accordingly, Mr. Drake relates: "The first seeds of domestic fruit brought to Oregon in quantities was by the Ralph C. Geer family who arrived in Oregon from Illinois. . . settling in the Waldo Hills in 1848. Mr. Geer brought one bushel of apple seeds and one-half bushel of pear seeds in the fall of 1848, losing no time in preparing the soil and planting the seed.

"Mr. Geer and a Mr. Lewelling, both nurserymen and both enroute to Oregon, met at St. Joe, Missouri. Lewelling had with him grafted fruit trees planted in soil in specially built wagon boxes. . . Later, Geer furnished the root stock grown from his

WASHINGTON — Potatoes once again are qualified for the government's school lunch program under an amendment to the cotton and wheat acreage allotments bill just signed by President Eisenhower.

When Congress in 1950 took price supports away from potatoes, its action also was construed to mean that potatoes wouldn't be eligible for the lunch program.

The Senate held that this was not intended and when the acreage allotments bill came up, Sen. Weiker (R-Idaho) added an amendment to put potatoes back into the school lunch and similar programs carried out from tariff collections on imports.

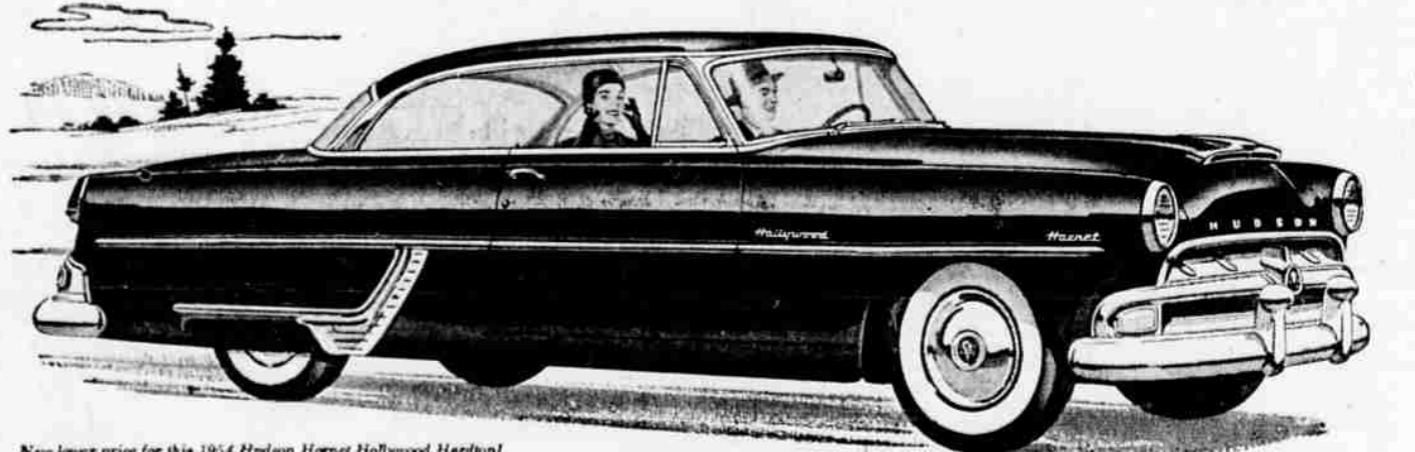
