

### FROM Peg in Washington

Washington, D.C., Feb. 6  
Dear Marian:  
A bit of the atmosphere of the Chicago convention that nominated Dwight D. Eisenhower was evident last night when the Lincoln Day Box Sopper opened the Republican centennial celebration at the huge Ulme Arena here. Sections were set aside for each of the 48 states and the usual convention markers served as gathering spots for former residents of each state. Of course, there was some overlapping—don't take that literally—as some persons sought better vantage points than their own state sections provided. At any rate, the Oregon section revealed a number of familiar faces, including some visitors from Oregon, Jess Gard, Republican national committeeman, Miss Shirley Field, and Kenneth Knox, all of Portland, with meetings of Republican officials, Republican women, and Young Republicans under way in Washington, many of those in the audience were visitors in Washington. It seemed natural to see Jess Gard and Shirley Field in a convention-type audience as they were part of the Oregon delegation in Chicago. Others in the Oregon rows were Mr. and Mrs. W. Scott (Dorothy McCullough) Lee, Mr. and Mrs. Harold B. Say, Congressman and Mrs. Sam Coon, Mr. and Mrs. George Scott, Congressman and Mrs. Homer Angell, Mrs. Larry Smyth, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Hinkley—she is secretary to Congressman Angell, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Woodring—he an adopted Oregonian as his wife is secretary to Congressman Walter Norblad, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carlson, the latter a niece of Mrs. Woodring and also on the Norblad staff, Mrs. Dorothy Jones, from Senator Cordon's office, and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Pope, the latter also one of the Senator's secretaries.

Just in front of the Oregon section was a model of the Lincoln Memorial designed in ice by a couple of federal officials who

make ice carvings a hobby. A light inside the 56-inch high model made a shimmering glow that lighted up the stacks and stacks of box lunches on the nearby counters. Warned that seats would be at a premium, several of us arrived at door-opening time, six o'clock, and we had just finished the fried chicken, salad, cup cake, and soft drink when promptly at seven o'clock, the entertainment program got under way under the direction of George Murphy, master of ceremonies, with a 200-voice chorus singing "The Star Spangled Banner." Singers, including the much-applauded Julius LaRosa dancers, and specialty acts filled the interval with Charles Spivak's orchestra until the program of talks by Republican Congressional leaders began. The roll call of speakers was again a reminder of the Chicago convention.

The President was escorted into the Arena at ten o'clock by the members of his cabinet who were seated with their wives in a special section of the hall. Speaking extemporaneously, there was an informality and warmth in his remarks and manner to which the audience was most responsive. Then, as in his campaign appearances, he went to the edge of the platform and escorted "my Mamie" to the center of the stage, where with former President Herbert Hoover, the three stood and received the tumultuous applause of the crowd. The 7500 people who filled the Arena had welcomed the surprise appearance of ex-President Hoover a little earlier in the program with three standing ovations.

All in all, it was a big night for the Republicans and there was enthusiastic participation in the closing song, "God Bless America." The whole thing brought back memories of when you and I were two of the countless thousands in Chicago—do you recall that bedlam of sound, confusion, lights, and thrills?

**New-Method Popovers**  
Ingredients: 1 cup sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk.  
Method: Stir flour and salt together; cut in shortening until texture is like cornmeal. Beat eggs and milk enough to combine; add to dry ingredients and beat until smooth. Place greased custard cups on baking sheet. Fill one-third full. Bake in moderate (375F) oven until well browned, about 50 minutes. Remove from oven and cut a slit in the side of each popover to let out steam. Return to oven for 10 minutes. Remove from cups at once and serve. Makes 12 medium or 8 large popovers.
