

Seek Mother Of Dead Infant

FOREST GROVE — Police Monday were searching for the mother of a dead baby, found Friday in a girl's dormitory at Pacific University.

The body of the newborn infant was in a locker of the dormitory guest room. An overnight guest of one of the students found the body wrapped in a woolen blanket when she opened the locker to store her clothes.

The room had not been used for some time and the baby, a male, appeared to have been dead several days.

Medical tests were made to determine cause of death. Saturday's autopsy disclosed no signs of violence.

Charles Armstrong, president of the co-educational university, said he did not believe any students were involved. He speculated that someone climbed through an unlocked window and left the baby in the vacant guest room.

Chicago Livestock

CHICAGO (U.S.A.)—Hogs sold mostly steady on the livestock market Monday although a few early sales of light weight offerings were down 25 cents from Friday's market.

Salable receipts totaled 8,500 head compared with 9,104 a week ago and 9,709 a year ago. Most 180 to 240 pound offerings brought \$26.00 to \$28.50 with the top \$28.45, down 10 cents from Friday. Sows weighing 600 pounds and less were \$21.00 to \$23.50.

Steers sold steady to 50 cents lower in the cattle section, where salable receipts totaled 20,000 head against 15,000 a week ago. The bulk of good and choice steers brought \$25.00 to \$27.00. A small supply of prime types moved at \$28.00 to \$29.50.

Utility and commercial cows were steady at \$11.00 to \$13.50 while canners and cutters were strong at \$9.50 to \$11.25. Commercial to prime vealers sold at \$17.00 to \$20.00.

Lambs were weak to 25 cents lower in a slow trade. Salable receipts at 3,500 head compared with 2,500 a week ago. Most sales of good and choice wooled lambs were made at \$20.00 to \$21.00 with a few choice and prime \$21.25 to \$22.50.
