This small beef loaf is fine for a family of four.

Oatmeal Loaf
Ingredients: 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup quick-cooking rolled oats, 3/4 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon chili sauce, 1 tablespoon finely grated onion (pulp and juice), 1 pound ground beef chuck.

Method: Beat egg and milk together; add oats and allow to stand about 10 minutes. Mix in salt, pepper, mustard, chili sauce, onion and beef. Press into small loaf pan (about 7 by 4 inches); run spatula around edges and turn out on shallow baking pan or ovenproof platter. Bake in moderate (350 F.) oven 50 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
