Mince-meat Turnovers
Ingredients: 4 pound butter or margarine, one 3-ounce package cream cheese, dash of salt, 1 cup sifted flour, 3/4 cup (about) ready-to-use mince-meat.

Method: Cream butter and cream cheese. Add salt and work in flour gradually with wooden spoon. Chill. Roll half the dough at one time; cut in 4-inch squares; put about a tablespoon of mince-meat on each square; fold over into triangle; pinch edges together with tines of fork. With fork, prick top in several places. Bake in hot (450 F.) oven about 12 minutes or until browned. Serve warm as they come from oven, or reheat. Makes 10 to 12 turnovers.
