

Free Speech on **Fluoridation**

Principal speaker at Wednesday night's meeting of the Public Ser-vice Forum held at the state library was Dr. Harold Erickson, state health officer. Erickson pointed out that although fluoridation of water was a controversial issue it was not of such a nature that governmental employes would be prohibited from expressing views concerning it. He added that on the basis of established factual data the State Board of Health is in favor of fluoridation as an important factor in preven-tive dentistry. City Water Manager John Geren

explained the costs and operating procedures that would be involved if Salem decided to add fluorides to its water. He said that the cost of a fluoridation program would be about ten cents per person per

Dr. John Dyke, Salem dentist, outlined the history of the study and application of fluoridation in this country. The dental profes-sion, he said, would be able to do a great deal more work on mouth diseases other than tooth decay if a fluoridation program was uni-versally accepted. Marion County Health Officer

Willard Stone said that surveys have indicated that there is two and one half times as much tooth decay in Marion county as in the rest of the country.

your correct tax-no more no less. It will pay you to think for a moment which of these three types of returns is the best and easiest form in your case. To do this you need to consider the size of your income, the sources of your in-come, your eligibility to deduct travel and reimbursed expenses from wages (see page 5 of the instructions with your 1953 Income Tax Form) and the size of your non-business deductions, such as contri-butions, medical expenses, etc (listed in detail on pages 10 and 11 of the instructions). The tax table used in comput ing the tax on Form 1040A and Short-Form 1040 automatically allows you approximate-ly 10 percent of your income to cover your non business de-
