Berry Growers Will Assemble

Two meetings for berry growers and processors have been scheduled for February 25 and 26 in Salem.

On Thursday, February 25, a strawberry growers meeting will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Izaak Walton League club house, 500 South Cottage Street. A caneberry growers meeting is slated for Friday, February 26, 1:30 p.m. in the Dairy Co-op building, 2135 Fairgrounds Road.

Both meetings will cover a variety of subjects affecting berry culture. At the strawberry growers meeting, Karl Hour will discuss "Soil Factors Affecting Strawberry Crop Production." Hour is division manager for the chemicals division, Pacific Supply Cooperative, Portland.

Extension Horticultural Specialist R. Ralph Clark, Oregon State College, will review "Results from the 1953 Strawberry Production Survey." "New Strawberry Varieties for Oregon Ber-

ry Growers" is the subject for George Waldo, USDA horticulturist stationed at OSC. Concluding the program will be "Suggestions for the Control of Strawberry Aphids and Other Strawberry Insects" by Robert W. Evers, entomology specialist at OSC.

George Waldo will also be one of the speakers at the caneberry growers meeting on February 26. Waldo will give a progress report on new caneberry varieties. Plant Pathologist E. K. Vaughan will discuss disease control problems in caneberreries. Dr. Quentin Zielinski, associate horticulturist, Oregon State College, will give a progress report on the use of growth regulators to increase berry size.

Both meetings are open to the public, Rasmussen says.

Would Write off Irrigation Debts

WASHINGTON — The House Reclamation Subcommittee Wednesday approved a bill to authorize new repayment contracts with two irrigation districts on the Umatilla Reclamation Project in Oregon which would write off \$1,778,506 in construction and other charges.

The districts are Hermiston, which would get a write-off of \$985,818, and West Extension, which would be relieved of \$792,688 in repayment charges.

Since 1910, the two districts have repaid to the government \$333,000 on the costs of the projects. The committee was informed by Secretary of Interior McKay that the two districts have been delinquent since 1928 in repayment of construction charges.

Independence Man Candidate

INDEPENDENCE, Ore. (AP)—Morton Tibbles, Independence Jersey breeder, will become a candidate for president of the American Jersey Cattle club this year.

Tibbles, who in 1951 was named master breeder, the highest honor for a Jersey breeder, will be opposed by two candidates from the East.

The election in the 4,000-member club will be held in Massachusetts in June.

Also announced at a February meeting of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club directors here Wednesday was a Jersey sale to be held at the State Fairgrounds in Salem, April 3.

Man of 103 Could Serve On Jury, Won't Have to

Not that Dad couldn't serve competently. The grey-haired, former slave still looks at you with clear brown eyes and he can hear a pin drop at 20 paces.

In fact, to prove he is "almost as good a man as ever," Dad serenaded Judge Rosselli in a warm baritone voice "Do You Hear the Saviour Pleading" and topped it off by flexing his powerful biceps and doing a modified buck-and-wing.

Actually it was all in a day's living for Dad Trimble, an ex-military show performer who is now a senior deacon in the Full Gospel Pentecostal Church.

Neighbors will tell you Dad shouldn't be excused from jury duty at all.

"Him and his cowering around with kids on the sidewalk," said one neighbor. "Why he can out-trace any boy in the neighborhood."

Dad shook his head, stomped his foot and admitted it was true.

"I'm my own lawn, too," he said. "But I didn't go out in the snow and throw snowballs with Sister Morris the bishop's wife even when she asked me. Wouldn't a man my age look silly doing that?"

Despite his unwrinkled skin and amazing physique, Dad isn't making any plans beyond tomorrow.

"It's all up to God," he said. "I'll never live 90 years like Methuselah. I know that for sure."

He has never been inside a jail or a courtroom and said he wouldn't know what to expect on a jury, except that "I don't want to sit in judgment of my fellow man."

Schulze Talks About Travels

Visiting Europe on a schedule that calls for touring seven countries in two months, doesn't make an expert, reported Dr. Daniel H. Schulze, professor of German at Willamette university while discussing his travels of last summer Wednesday noon with the Salem Rotary club.

Dr. Schulze came back with his own impressions but he said he was by no means an expert concerning the political or economic life of Great Britain or the Continent.

The tour was made with 26 students and young teachers, with Dr. Schulze sharing the responsibility of leadership with another man. They found food plentiful and cheaper than in the United States and the hotels medium priced as well as more expensive, clean and comfortable.

Colored pictures taken during the tour were shown by Dr. Schulze. The pictures gave the viewer a good idea of the mode of life of the countries visited.

The tour taken by Dr. Schulze was one of more than 150 sponsored by a central agency, Mark O. Hatfield, dean of students and assistant professor of political science at Willamette, plans to head a tour next summer which will specialize in government.

Kimsey Files Charge of Labor Discrimination

SALEM — State Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey accused the Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission Wednesday of discriminating against Richard E. Winslow, 25, Portland Negro, and suggested that the commission hire him as a field examiner.

Commission Chairman T. Morris Dunne, however, would not say he would comply with Kimsey's request.

Dunne said that Winslow and two others on a civil service list would be interviewed Thursday about the job.

Kimsey, who wrote the commission that "there is evidence of violation of the law prohibiting discrimination in employment," indicated he would order a public hearing if the commission doesn't hire Winslow.

Winslow's name was one of three submitted by the Civil Service Commission to the Unemployment Commission.

The Unemployment Commission rejected the other two names, and then called for a new list, on which Winslow's name again appeared.

Kimsey, who administers the state fair employment practices law, pointed out that Winslow was not interviewed for the job.

He said that the Unemployment Commission had a good idea that Winslow was a Negro because one of his references was Edwin C. Berry, Portland Negro and executive secretary of the Urban League of Portland.

Winslow filed a complaint last Monday that the Unemployment Commission had discriminated against him by not giving him the job, which consists of examining employers' records.
