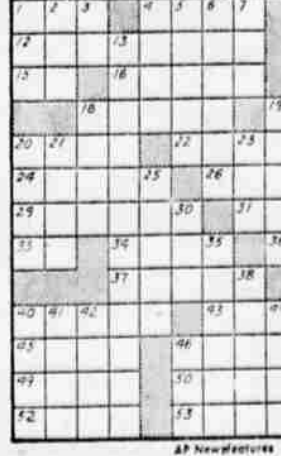


Crossword Puzzle

New Tissue Machine Planned at St. Helens

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Expansion plans which will cost 14 to 15 million dollars have been announced by the Crown Zellerbach Corp. for its plant at St. Helens, Ore. The company said Wednesday it will install a new tissue machine with a capacity of 35,000 tons a year. Another paper machine at the plant will be modernized and speeded up, pulp capacity will be increased and other buildings renovated, the announcement said.

Man Who Refused to Give up Plates Upheld

PORTLAND (AP)—A district court jury decided Wednesday that a 20-year-old Gresham man was right in refusing to give up his automobile license plates to a state policeman. Patrolman James C. Burns said the youth, Robert Waggoner, was no longer entitled to the plates under the state financial responsibility law. Waggoner's attorney contended, however, that Waggoner had the right to refuse to give them up. Waggoner said Burns hit him over the head with handcuffs when he refused to surrender the plates.
