Open Sardine and Cheese Sandwiches

Ingredients: 4 slices bread, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 2 teaspoons finely grated onion, one 3 1/2 ounce can Norwegian sardines, 1 canned pimiento, 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Method: Toast bread on one side only. Meanwhile mix cheese with onion; spread on untoasted side of bread. Arrange sardines over cheese so that they look the way they do in the can; cut pimiento in strips and arrange crosswise over sardines; sprinkle with lemon juice. Broil just until topping is hot. Serve at once. Makes 2 to 4 servings.
