WOODBURN — Seven applicants for the proposed position of full-time fire chief for the city of Woodburn and the Woodburn rural fire protection district have been interviewed but no action has been taken on the selection of a chief pending meetings of the council and board of directors.

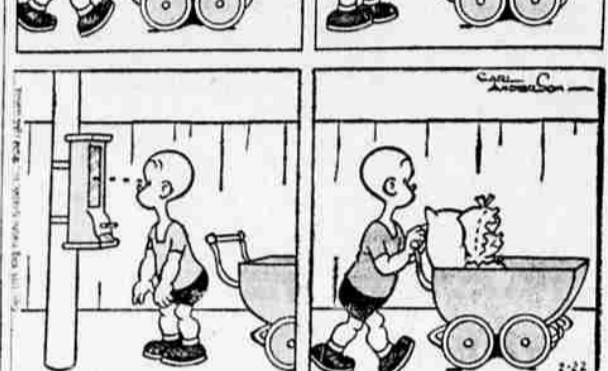
Applicants are Floyd Maricle, present local fire chief; a D. Merle Leighty, both of Wood-

burn; Thomas Lay and Clyde Buchholz of Salem; Jack Cooper, assistant fire chief at Sunnyside, Wash.; Don Barner, former fire chief of Centralia, Wash.; and Walter P. Smith of Mt. Angel.

Interviewing the applicants were Jess Fikken and Dr. James Deagan representing the Woodburn city council, President Lynn Simon and David St. John from the district board of directors of the rural fire protection district.
