If they were intended as a trial balloon to sound out Western reaction, destruction regardless of the win-then they were well planned, with ner. then they were well planned, with just about every pro - Moscow group briefed ahead of time.

Opening up to Westerners to an unprecedented degree during the conference, a Russian official said frankly Malenkov wants to meet Churchill and possibly Eisenhower too. Polish and Czecholovak newsmen said this was true, and East German Communist authorities concurred.




