He will demonstrate by the use of a Geiger counter the testing of rocks for the presence of uranium. He especially urged that anyone attending the lecture should bring samples of rock which they would like to have tested in that way.

# Chest to Make 1954 Campaign

The Salem Community Chest has voted to continue through 1954 and to conduct its usual campaign, C. A. Kells, secretary, reported today.

The question had arisen by reason of committee studies on a possible shift to United Fund, which the Chest agreed could not in any event be made in time for this year's campaign.

The board elected the Chest president, Otto Wilson, as Salem's representative on the board of the Oregon Chest. Resignations of Dr. Robert F. Anderson and Mrs. E. A. Carleton from the board were accepted.

Wilson reported that 1953 and cash payments from the 1953 campaign have now passed the \$120,000 mark as he had earlier forecast that they would. The report of the treasurer, Arthur B. Bates, showed that as of Jan. 31 the Chest had \$61,704.73 in Salem financial institutions and had disbursed \$45,990.88 on 1954 fiscal year account, principally to the agencies.

The body of the former Montana school teacher was found crumpled beneath a clump of bushes in a Portland suburban area Thursday night. There were no marks on the body and minute tissue investigations so far have failed to turn up conclusive evidence of the death cause.

Capt. Howard Kelly and county detectives declined to comment on results of their investigations last night and today at the Sack apartment or of their interviews with neighbors and acquaintances.

Sack was arrested after witnesses reported seeing his car at the scene where the body was found. Subsequent investigations linked Sack with probes into the violent death of his first two wives in Chicago and the disappearance of two persons in Washington.

# McCarthy and Stevens Clash Over Army Quiz

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens and Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), fresh from a running clash over McCarthy's interrogation of Army officers, met face to face on the issue tomorrow before a nationwide audience.

Turned down twice in two days on demands he made to the Army, McCarthy has summoned its civilian head to appear before his Senate investigations subcommittee here at 10:30 a.m. EST tomorrow.

He said Stevens would be asked to explain what the senator termed an attempt by the Army "to coddle and promote Communists."

Stevens said he received no official notification, but would be glad to appear. That was after he had ordered two generals not to comply with calls for their appearance before McCarthy's subcommittee.

Objecting to the humiliation he said was inflicted on one of them at a hearing by McCarthy last week, Stevens said, "I cannot permit the loyal officers of our armed forces to be subjected to such unwarranted treatment."

The secretary is a former textile manufacturer who himself served as an Army officer in both world wars.

He said he was afraid the "prestige and morale" of the military would be weakened by "unfair tactics on our officer corps."

Tomorrow's hearing will be public and will be broadcast by the National Broadcasting Co. television network.

On Friday the Army let go by a deadline McCarthy had set for it to produce the names of all personnel connected with the promotion and honorable discharge of a reserve officer who had declined to say

whether he was ever a Communist. The information has not yet been given the senator.

McCarthy said in New York yesterday that the reserve major involved, Dr. Irving Peress, a dentist, was "commissioned, promoted, saved from overseas orders and awarded an honorable discharge, all despite an open record of active membership in the Communist conspiracy."

Sen. Saltonstall (R, Mass.) described the meeting as "very interesting."

House Republican Leader Martin (Mass.) said Dulles gave a "very interesting" report but he would not discuss it further.

House Democratic Leader Rayburn (Texas) nodded agreement with Martin.

Others attending the session were Sens. Wiley (R, Wis.), Lyndon Johnson (D, Texas), Clements (D, Ky.), George (D, Ga.), and Russell (D, Ga.), and Reps. Arends (R, Ill.), Chipperfield (R, Ill.), Vinson (D, Ga.), McCormack (D, Mass.) and Richards (D, S.C.).

Today's close meeting is the first of five reports Dulles will give on the results of the four-week session with Russia's Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, Britain's Anthony Eden and France's Georges Bidault.

More Explanations Coming  
In a move to reassure uneasy legislators, Dulles is expected to stress that the forthcoming parity with the Communists, set for April 26, does not foreshadow formal American diplomatic recognition or membership in the United Nations for the Peiping regime.

The secretary is reported ready to argue that the terms agreed upon were necessary in order to cut through the deadlocked preliminary peace talks at Panmunjom, which had been stalled since last Dec. 12 over a name-calling wrangle.

The secretary plans to follow up today's meeting by reporting tomorrow to the full House Foreign Affairs Committee in a closed door meeting. On Wednesday he is to give a similar accounting to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

He is to give a nationwide 30-minute radio and television report to the nation Wednesday night.

State would do it. And if this official refuses, the Supreme Court would do the reapportioning. Baum argues that the amendment violates the constitutional provision for separation of powers among the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, who is defending the amendment, denies Baum's claim. He says the people have a right to amend the state constitution without having it declared in violation of other provisions of the constitution.

## Nehru Calls for

Speaking in a lower house debate on President Rajendra Prasad's inaugural address, Nehru reasserted India's independent foreign policy with the declaration:

**India Bars Foreign Troops**  
"On no account, whatever the occasion may be, are we going to allow any foreign troops to land in India."

Deputies cheered as Nehru, in a renewed attack on proposed U. S. military aid to Pakistan, said:

"We do not want to enter into this circle of hatred, violence and fear that is the Cold War—and we do not want others to do so either."

Ripples of laughter swept the chamber when Nehru ridiculed a suggestion "that because the United States is doing this we will rush to the Soviet Union and get their military aid."

Rejecting at the same time a proposal that India should seek American arms aid to keep pace with Pakistan, Nehru said "our foreign policy is not a tactical exercise but something based on the long-standing approach of our freedom movement."
