Manion Lays Firing to Labor in Bricker Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Clarence E. Manion says his dismissal as chairman of a presidential commission stems from his views on states rights and was "triggered" by his support of the Bricker amendment to limit treaty powers. Manion, former law school dean at Notre Dame, announced last Wednesday that he had been asked by the White House to resign as chairman of President Eisenhower's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. He said the request was made by Sherman Adams, chief presidential assistant.

What happened, Manion told interviewers on an NBC television program Sunday, was that: "Adams told me I was very busy and he thought I should resign. That's precisely what he said. I asked for some further explanation. He said there had been some dissatisfaction on the part of the commission. He refused to amplify. He said it had all been decided. He never said I was fired because of the Bricker amendment."

Road Block Saves Draft Evaders

WASHINGTON (AP)—The justice department said Monday the government has reached a legal roadblock which has halted prosecution of six men as draft evaders. It also said the number is likely to grow to 16 and perhaps higher.

The hub of the problem is the government's unwillingness to produce in court actual FBI files on the men because it says the files might disclose confidential informants or investigating techniques.

The cases involve conscientious objectors who have refused to be drafted because of their religious belief. They're in four states—three in Montana, and one each in Virginia, Connecticut and Nebraska.

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — The worst storm and floods in New South Wales' history ended Monday, leaving some 3,000 square miles of the state's northern coast a devastated shambles. Eighteen persons, and possibly 22, were dead, thousands were homeless and the damage was reckoned in the millions of pounds.

Republican Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado, a commission member who said after a talk with Adams last week he didn't think the Bricker amendment controversial had anything to do with Manion's dismissal, stuck to that view.

"Although I have the highest regard for Dr. Manion," he said in Denver after the TV show, "he was too busy going around the country making speeches instead of doing his job. The commission was brought into being by Congress and was given a March 15 deadline to accomplish a purpose. They have done some work—but only what should have been accomplished in two or three months."

Manion said that when he was selected for the commission post, the White House knew he had a heavy calendar of speaking engagements and "I was assured it would take only two or three days a month." He said he had plenty of time to devote to the commission and worked for it part of every day.

Royal Pair Send For Two Children

LONDON (AP)—Mother love triumphed today over official protocol, Buckingham Palace announced the two children of Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh would join the royal couple in North Africa to complete the round-the-world Commonwealth tour with them.

Prince Charles, 5, and Princess Anne, 3, will sail from Portsmouth April 15 aboard the royal yacht Britannia to join the Queen and Duke in Tobruk, the palace announced. The royal couple now is in Tasmania.
