

Fish need oxygen in the water in order to live. Pollution in streams robs the water of this life-giving element. During the summer months, especially, the Willamette has been practically an open sewer for much of its distance. At Portland, the oxygen has been been during during the seven between the has been so lacking during these periods that fish could not survive. What this means, is that in the past, migrating fish have had a tough time running the gauntlet of this deadly water. This has tough time running the gauntilet of this deadly water. This has been a factor that has strongly contributed to the elimination of runs of steelhead and salmon up the Willamette and its tributaries. Thus, if pollution is largely eliminated, fish again will have a chance to migrate successfully. Then it will be possible for the game commission to work effectively to restore runs of migratory fish to our western Cascade streams. While all this talk of sewage disposal may sound pretty dull to a lot of folks, to the angler it means fish on the line—days of fun and relaxa-tion, not only to him, but to those who come after him. Every-body has a stake in making the waters of Oregon clean again.
