The Dayton Garden Club met with Mrs. Mariam Krake with 25 members and one guest, Mrs. Ona Churchman of Newberg, present.

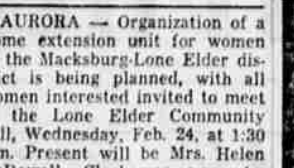
Mrs. Steve Taylor presided over the business meeting.
