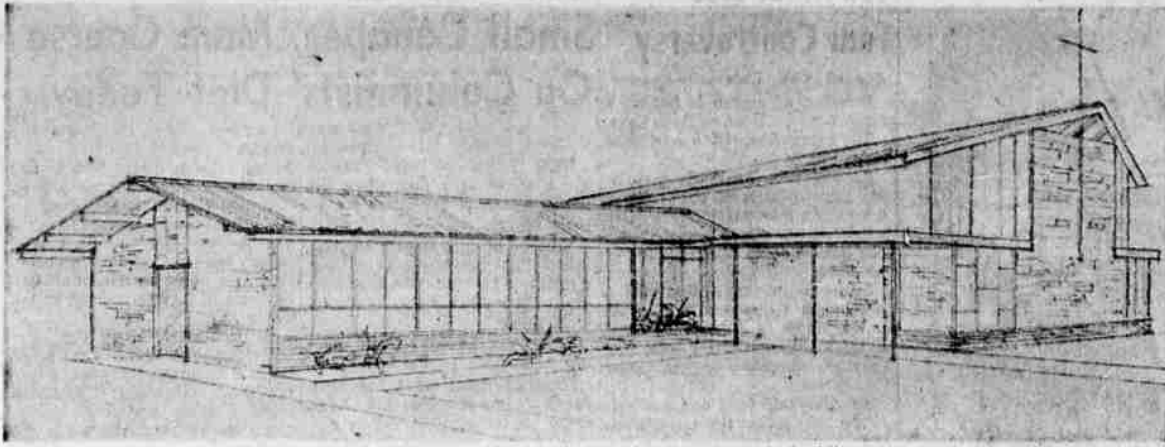


CHURCH HAS BUILDING PROJECT

Church Starts New Project

The congregation of the First Church of God, led by the pastor, Rev. H. J. McIntire, met Friday night at the present church building to kick-off a drive for a new building.

Plans for the new building have been drawn by James L. Payne, architect. A contract has not yet been let, but the project is to be hastened and it is hoped the building will be completed for use on Easter Sunday, April 18.

The location will be on Lancaster Drive about a quarter mile east of Silverton Road where the church recently acquired property. The present church is at North Cottage and Hood.

The new building will be of Tuff-stone material. The auditorium will be 36 by 72 feet and a Christian education wing 32 by 76. The building will accommodate an audience of 250 or 300 persons. The cost of the structure is estimated at about \$45,000.

Later plans call for a recreation building. This summer the church intends to set up a recreation area for tennis, softball and other outdoor sports.

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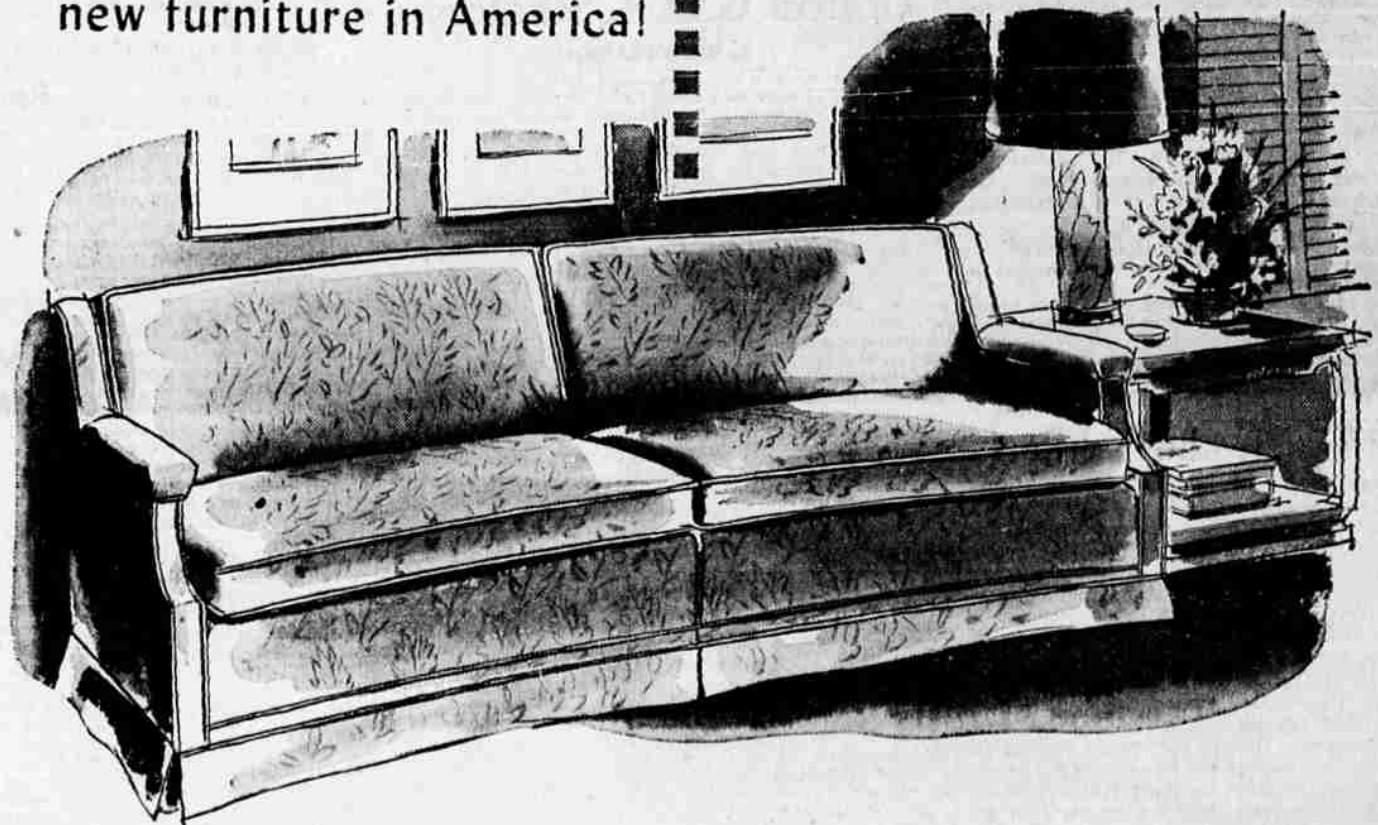
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Middle Grove
