The re-ised plans were prepared jointly by the Oregon and Washington Highway departments to meet objections of towboat operators. They contended the original specifications, which called for a new bridge to run parallel to the present span, did not give enough clearance.

HANOI, Indochina W — The French Claimed new successes Monday in flushing Vietminh rebels out of the key Red River low-lands of north Indochina, with 92 scattered one Red commanded Vietminh battalion in a sharp Dinh sector, 30 miles south of Hanoi. The French Union forces had "light losses," the announcement said, while 92 Vietminh were killed and 98 captured.

French Union patrols in the mountains of north Indochina continued to feel out the positions of 36,000 rebels entrenched around the major French fortification of Dien Bien Phu. No major contact was reported.
