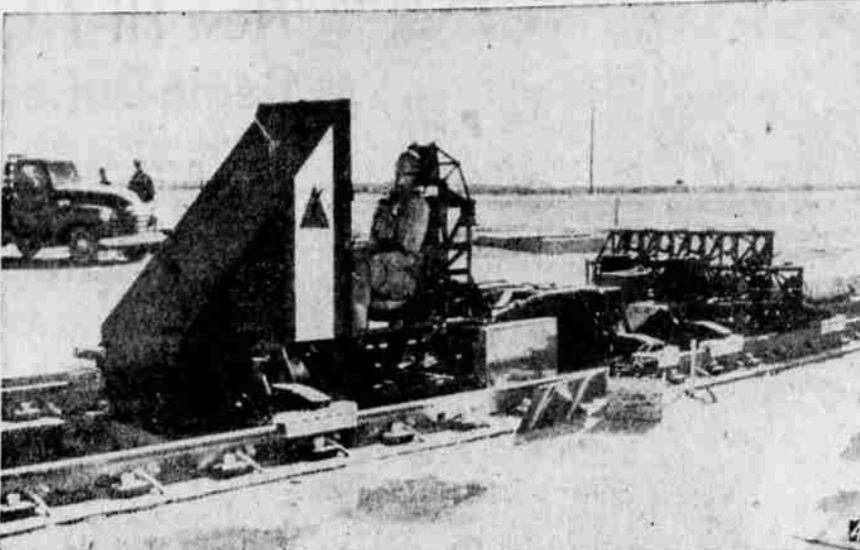
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SUPERSONIC TOBOGGAN



This 750-mile-an-hour rocket sled will soon be ridden by Air Force volunteers to devise and test equipment to protect air men bailing out of planes at supersonic speeds. A dummy, above is being used in first tests at the Holloman Air Development Center at Alamogordo, New Mexico. The sled powered by 12 powerful rockets, travels on rails. The passenger is strapped in a chair rotating him head over heels 180 times a minute, exposing him to air blasts experienced in a supersonic bail out.
