22 Cases of Mumps Reported for Week

Twenty-two cases of mumps during the week ending February 27 indicated that the epidemic was still prevalent, according to a communicable and reportable disease summary issued by the Marion County Department of Health.

Seventeen of the total cases of mumps were reported from Salem.

Other diseases listed included: six measles, two each of syphilis and gonorrhea; and one each of

conjunctivitis, hepatitis, Impetigo, lobar pneumonia, virus pneumonia and tuberculosis. Seventy-five physicians, or 65 percent of those in the county, provided information for the report.
