

Pope Observes 78th Birthday Tuesday in Bed

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican's white and golden flags flew Tuesday in honor of the 78th birthday and 15th anniversary of the pontificate of Pope Pius XII, reported maintaining his slow recovery from a long illness.

The mass was celebrated by the pope's vicar for Rome, Clemente Cardinal Micara, as one of the final services in three days of special prayer and other spiritual offerings in the city's 500 churches for recovery of the pope, the bishop of Rome.

Vatican sources said his slight daily improvement continued. Messages from all parts of the world poured into the Vatican, greeting the frail pontiff and expressing wishes for his full recovery from the abdominal ailment that has confined him to his apartment for 36 days.

He is a native son, born in Rome as Eugenio Pacelli March 2, 1876. The men of his family had served for generations in the civil service of the papal states in the period when popes were temporal sovereigns of Central Italy.

In Rome's St. Mary Major Basilica, the world's oldest shrine to the Virgin Mary and the place in which the pope said his own first mass 34 years ago, thousands attended a high mass for his recovery.

Ordnained a priest in 1899, he became the spiritual leader of the world's Roman Catholics 40 years later, after the death of Pope Pius XI. The weakening ailment which struck him Jan. 25 has been tentatively diagnosed as gastritis. A more specific diagnosis will be made, doctors said, as soon as it is possible to take X-rays of the pope's stomach walls and adjoining organs. This has not yet been possible because the pope cannot retain the barium solution necessary for X-rays.

Demos Call for Rigid Supports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. Russell (D-Ga.) and Mansfield (D-Mont.) challenged Tuesday Secretary of Agriculture Benson's contention that the slide in farm prices has been halted.

Russell, an advocate of rigid price supports for major field crops, said in an interview Benson's contention in his annual report that 1953 was a year in which the long decline in agriculture prices had been halted is "news to the farmers."

"The farmers are wondering what has happened to the 1 1/2 billion dollars that didn't get into their pockets in 1953," Russell said. He added he was alluding to that size drop in income under the 1952 level.

"I agree with the report of the Senate-House Economic Committee which said this is no time to be reducing supports on basic commodities," Russell continued. "However, I have no quarrel with Mr. Benson's action in cutting supports on dairy products from 90 per cent to 75 per cent because dairy production can be controlled effectively."

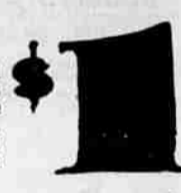
