FROM Peg in Washington

Washington, D. C., March 8

Dear Marian:

Having said that Washington is always unpredictable—without having meant the climate nor the people—the statement can be repeated this week as Secretary Douglas McKay's plans were changed overnight and he remained in Washington rather than going to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, where an annual board meeting was scheduled. Security officers decreed the change in plans following the fanatical attack on Congressional members. As a result, the Secretary had an opportunity to hold conferences with several territorial governors in the city for Congressional hearings, with representatives of a number of Indian tribes, and with some Oregonians who were in Washington during the week.

Among the governors were Governor Frank Heintzelman of Alaska and Governor Samuel Wilder King of Hawaii. Both of the chief executives are concerned with current statehood bills, as well as with other pending legislation affecting their territories. Governor Luis Munoz Marin of Puerto Rico called on the Secretary during his round of courtesy visits in the national capitol, expressing his grief over the occurrence on Monday and assuring officials that the attackers were but a small segment of the people of Puerto Rico.

Several western states including Oregon were represented in the Indian tribes that talked with Secretary McKay on problems of their reservations. Last Star, of the Blackfeet of Montana, greeted the Secretary with the title that the tribe had conferred on him, "Chief Mountain," and conveyed his best wishes to "Cougar Woman," as Mrs. McKay was designated by the tribe.

Oregonians who chatted with the Secretary included Phil Schnell of Portland, who had been enjoying a visit with former Salemites, Dr. and Mrs. Verdon Hockett, at Norfolk. Dr. Hockett is a Navy captain. Mr. Schnell said Mrs. Schnell was in Salem visiting the new grandchild while he was on the eastern trip. Chester Moores of Portland, whose sister, Mrs. A. S. Wells, lives in Salem, where he, too, formerly made his home, called in following port hearings on the "hill" Loran Stewart, Culp Creek lumberman and Lane county representative, here also on port hearings, discussed interior affairs with the Secretary, as he is a member of the O & C Advisory Board.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lohrport, Portland, have been in Washington for the American Legion Rehabilitation Conference, and lunched with their long-time friend, Secretary McKay, on Thursday.

Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Hagenstein, of Portland, were here where his interests as head of the Industrial Forestry association kept him occupied. Mrs. Hagenstein and I lunched on Wednesday with secretaries in Congressional Harris Ellsworth's office, Mrs. Landon Mitchell and Mrs. Hayden Garber, and I learned that she is a legislative candidate from Multnomah county. Ruth Hagenstein has been active in civic and women's organizations in Portland and this is her first entrance into politics as an office-seeker.

Other Oregonians here included W. L. Williams, chairman of the Port of Portland Commission; Howard Hindsdale, Reedsport; and Frank Farrell and Glenn Jackson, both of Medford.

The White House Correspondents' dinner on Saturday night honoring President Eisenhower provided top notch entertainment, including the appearance of Irving Berlin, and Secretary McKay was happy to have been re-invited after his original need to decline because of the planned trip to the Virgin Islands. A former fellow-governor of the Pacific Coast, the present Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Earl Warren, was the honored guest at a dinner the Secretary attended. The Chief Justice and Mrs. Warren were the special guests of Senator and Mrs. H. Alexander Smith at the Subgrave club formal dinner—a dinner that Mrs. McKay missed due to her visit at home. As a personal note, it's splendid that she is having time with the family in Salem, but she is missed here and I'll be glad when we resume our daily phone check-up next week.
