Kindly Act Gets Hendrie Into Court

The first person to plead innocent to "meter feeding" in Municipal court was found guilty Friday by Judge Douglas Hay but got off pretty easy anyway.

Donald A. Hendrie, of Hendrie Medical Laboratories in the Lively building, based his plea of innocence of the charge of putting an extra coin in a meter after the time had expired on the contention that not he but someone else had put the coin in the meter.

His work kept him from moving his car before he time expired, he said, so he expected a ticket for overtime parking when he went out. Instead, he had a ticket for meter feeding because a friend had put a nickel in the meter for him when he saw the time had run out, Hendrie said. Hall on overtime parking is 50 cents, on meter feeding \$1.50.

Judge Hay listened sympathetically, found him guilty and fined him 50 cents.

Trees to Be Cut in Van Duzer Corridor

The Oregon State Highway Commission finds it necessary to cut some of the old-growth timber in the magnificent Henry B. Van Duzer Timber Corridor along Salmon River on State Route 18.

For some time there has been an increasing blowdown of timber on the south and west side of the corridor. On January 21 of this year some 600 trees in the corridor blew down, of which 60 trees fell across the highway. It was a very serious condition and extremely dangerous to the traveling public. On this occasion alone nine cars and 15 people were caught between the falling trees.

Other serious falls have occurred along the Van Duzer Corridor on November 13 and 24, 1951, December 17 and 18, 1951, and January 7, 1952.

Salem Police Hosts To Shooting Teams

Salem police will play host Sunday to pistol marksmen from several other Oregon cities both in team shooting and individual marksmanship at the annual Oregon Association of City Police Officers Marksmanship contest.

The contest will be held at the city police range at McNary field.

32 Killed in

Qantas said the plane also was carrying two bags of mail from Queen Elizabeth's touring party in Western Australia, and films and photographs of the royal tour for British newspapers.

Women among the relatives and friends waiting at the airport stood horrified and crying as the aircraft burst into flames after a loud explosion.

Black smoke rose 300 feet. After the firemen put out the blaze, rescue workers, mainly Europeans spending Saturday afternoon at the Singapore Swimming Club, rushed onto the field and began the task of extricating passengers.

Eight crewmen survived the crash and were hospitalized but BOAC officials said two Americans and one Canadian were among the passengers.

The Singapore Standard said the Americans were believed to be released after treatment.

BOAC said eight passengers were British, six New Zealanders, four Australians, two American, one Canadian, one South African, one Fijian, three Indonesian, two Indians, two Dutch and one Chinese. One crew member also perished.

The big four-engine plane, operated by a British Commonwealth company, was coming in from Jakarta, Indonesia, where it had stopped over on its regularly scheduled flight from Sydney, Australia, to London.

It crashed at the end of the runway after skimming over rooftops on a normal approach for the landing. Flames enveloped the plane and roared out of control for more than an hour.

When the blaze was quelled, the firemen broke into the plane with axes to pull out the charred remains of the victims.

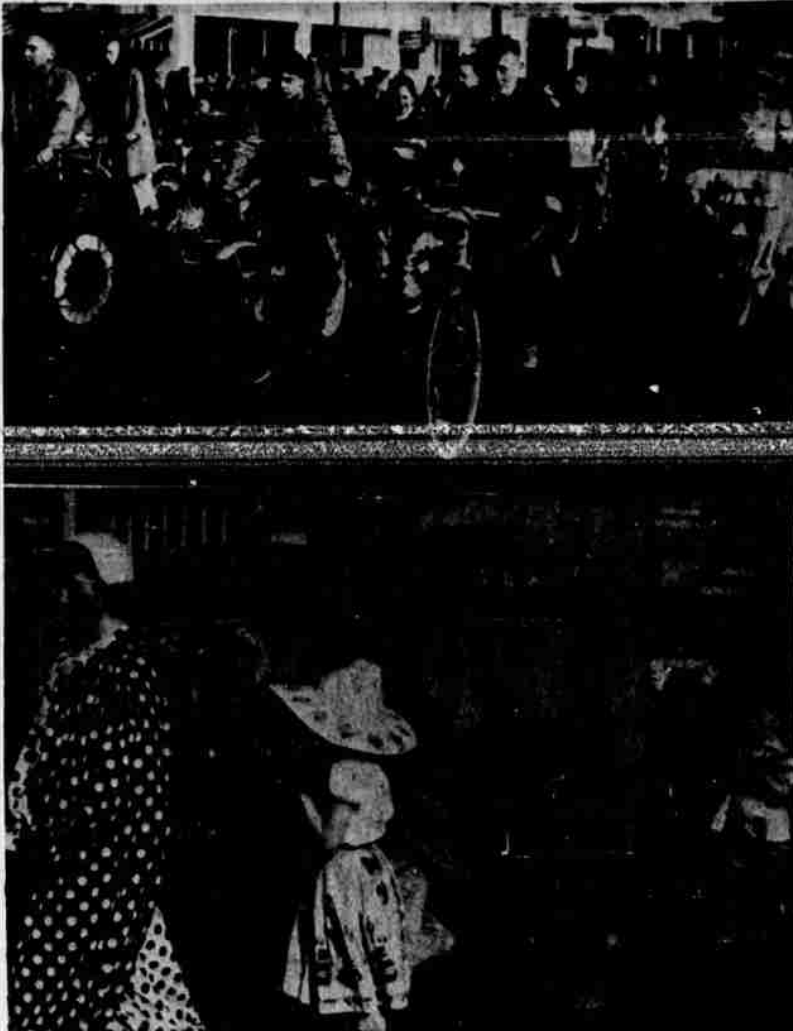

DOWNTOWN MERCHANTS SPONSOR CHILDREN'S PARADE

Filing Ends

A total of 272 candidates for state offices, both Republicans and Democrats filed, a number which fell short of the expected 300 candidates, the usual number of filings in an "off" election year.

John F. Steelhammer, former Speaker of the House, had the large groups of legislators, lobbyists, and interested citizens who gathered around Election Chief Dave O'Hara's office guessing until the 5 o'clock closing time. For Steelhammer had papers filled out together with a check for \$200 ready to file for State Senator from Marion county. But for reasons that he did not disclose, he did not file.

The eight Republican candidates who seek the four Marion County house seats, all of whom had previously announced intention to run are: Reps. W. W. Chadwick, and Robert L. Elstrom, Mayor Al Loucks, of Salem, Eddie Ahrens, of Turner, State Labor Commissioner William E. Kimsey, Salem, Robert P. Cook, Silverton, E. W. Acklin and Jason Lee, both of Salem. Guy W. Jonas, of Salem, was the only Democratic candidate to file for the house.

The crowd that gathered to participate or watch the 272 filings was not as large as two years ago. In 1952 delegates to the two national conventions were required to file, with the result that 50 Republicans and a goodly number of Democrats filed for convention delegates to add to the number that gathered in the capitol corridors at that time.

Senator Elmo Smith, of John Day, one of the two candidates for the presidency of the Senate was among those present, although Senator Phil Hitchcock, of Klamath Falls, the other candidate for the senate presidency was not present. Neither Dave Baum nor Ed Geary, the two candidates for speaker were present, Baum wiring that he was participating in a Legion building dedication and Geary having not yet returned from New Zealand where he and his wife are now visiting.

Four Republican candidates will vie for one Polk House seat, these being Joseph H. Harland, Rickreall, Agnes G. Schucking, Eola; Dr. O. A. Olson and Peter Pankrat, all of West Salem, with William D. McArthur of Monmouth the lone Democratic House candidate.
