"They seek to overthrow the lawful and friendly government of Viet Nam, which we recognize, and they have invaded Laos and Cambodia."

"We realize that these activities not only threaten those involved, but also endanger the peace and security of the entire area of Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific, where our two nations and other friendly and allied nations have vital interests."

"Accordingly, we are ready to take part with the other countries principally concerned in an examination of the possibility of establishing a collective defense within the framework of the charter of the United Nations to assure the Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific."

"It is our hope that the Geneva conference will lead to the restoration of peace in Indochina. We believe that the prospect of establishing a unity of defensive purpose throughout Southeast Asia and in the Western Pacific will contribute to an honorable peace in Indochina."

Cole described Holliday as "a good Christian gentleman" but said he might be held partially responsible for abuses under the repair program because "I believe he has been aware of it and did not act."

Holliday, appointed by President Eisenhower, had been in the office a year.

The announcement of Mason's appointment coincided with an indication from Chairman Capenhart (R-Ind.) that his Senate Banking Committee may join in the already wide-spread investigation series.

The housing and home finance agency headed by Cole, which is the over-all agency of which FHA is a part, already had an inquiry going. And Cole at a news conference said the FBI was being called in to study any "illegal or unethical action" in the apartment financing phase of the matter. He said inflated appraisals already had cost the government more than \$75 million dollars.

Top Scientist

Nichols' letter said 16 specific allegations of subversive activities had been leveled against Oppenheimer. One was that he had aided against construction of the H-bomb, even after former President Truman approved it.

The letter, dated last Dec. 23, advised Oppenheimer:

"It was reported further that you were instrumental in persuading other scientists not to work on the hydrogen bomb project and that the opposition to the hydrogen bomb, of which you are the most experienced, most powerful and most effective member, has definitely slowed down its development."

"The commission has no other recourse, in the discharge of its obligations to protect the common defense and security, but to suspend your clearance (to have atomic information) until the matter has been resolved."

"Accordingly, your employment on Atomic Energy Commission work and your eligibility for access to restricted data are hereby suspended."

In reply, Oppenheimer wrote a 43-page letter on March 4 which he called "a summary account of relevant aspects of my life."

In the letter, the scientist took up each of the allegations raised in Nichols' letter including the statement that he had argued against development of the hydrogen bomb in 1949.

Opposed Crash Program
Oppenheimer said he as well as the entire general advisory committee on atomic matters, made up of top-level scientists, argued against the rapid build-up of H-weapons, which the scientist referred to as a "crash program."

He said the committee submitted a report to the AEC stating that "such a program might weaken rather than strengthen the position of the United States."

But, Oppenheimer said, he and the other members of the committee shifted signals after President Truman announced in January, 1950, that the United States would proceed with the H-bomb program.

"I never urged anyone not to work on the hydrogen bomb project," Oppenheimer said.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said in a television speech last week that development of the H-bomb was delayed for 18 months and asked whether subversives might have been behind the delay.

Neither Nichols' nor Oppenheimer's letter mentioned McCarthy.

Oppenheimer, now 49, acknowledged that in his younger years he had associated with Communists and contributed to some Communist causes.

He added:

"Because of these... I might well have appeared at the time as quite close to the Communist party—perhaps even to some people as belonging to it. As I have said, some of its declared objectives seemed to be desirable. But I was never a member of the Communist party. I never accepted Communist dogma in theory; in fact, it never made sense to me. I had no clearly formulated political views. I hated tyranny and repression and every form of dictatorial control of thought."

The scientist, now director of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, declared:

"I have reviewed two decades of my life. I have recalled instances where I acted unwisely. What I have hoped was, not that I could wholly avoid error, but that I might learn from it."

"What I have learned has, I think, made me more fit to serve my country."

Street Project

O'Hara reluctantly voted for the bill calling a special election May 21, declaring that he didn't think any of the measures were of such emergency proportions that they couldn't wait until the November election. However, he agreed that the Capital Journal building bill and the property contract bill were good measures, and voted for the special election for that reason.

"I don't question anyone's good faith," O'Hara said with reference to the other two measures, "but taxes are getting so high in Salem and they are a discouraging burden."

He said he believed the 12th street and the Ferry street projects could be paid for from the state tax street fund and the existing 3-mill street levy, which he said would amount to \$268,000 and \$71,000 respectively. Government grant money doubtless would be available later he added.

Mayor Loucks replied to O'Hara by saying "we certainly are not happy to put any financial measures on the ballot," but he explained that the program had been cut to the bare necessities, and that "we have eliminated millions in improvements needed in order to come down to this \$330,000 (not including the South River road item)."

"It takes courage to put forward a program like this," the mayor said. He cited the dangerous condition of 12th street and fatalities that have occurred, and mentioned the investigation made by the League of Women Voters, which was instrumental in bringing about the project. The mayor did not agree with O'Hara that state money coming to the city was sufficient to warrant its use for the projects.

Alderman Fry challenged O'Hara's contention that the state money could be used without endangering the city budget.

Explaining his vote on the 12th street bill O'Hara, reading from the ordinance bill, heatedly said: "I defy anyone to tell you this ordinance what is going to be done on that street."

The South River road project was added as a ballot measure when Mayor Loucks said he had found out the county intended to proceed with improvement of the road from south city limits to Roberts. Alderman Chase opposed it as an expense not warranted at this time.
