NLRB Loses Out Before Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Labor Relations Board lost out on two counts before the Supreme Court Monday in its efforts to get tougher with the non-Communist oath provision of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

In one case the district court held that the NLRB lacks power to inquire into the truth or falsity of non-Communist affidavits signed by union officers. That decision was given in cases affecting the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers and the American Communications Assn. In the second case the district court ruled against a broad policy to withhold certification of a union that won a bargaining election if the union has an officer under indictment on a charge that he falsely made a non-Communist affidavit. The second decision was a victory for the International Fur and Leather Workers' Union.

15 Projects for Airforce OK'd

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Armed Services Committee approved 15 Air Force public works projects at a secret session today.

The projects are part of a \$77 million dollar military construction program proposed by the administration. Part of the funds have been previously authorized by Congress but the money to carry them out was not appropriated or spent.

Total amounts carried for the bases approved today included: Castle Air Force Base, Merced, Calif., \$9,581,000; Davis Monthan Air Force Base, Tucson, Ariz., \$3,034,000; Fairchild Air Force Base, Spokane, \$6,796,000.

His subject for the meeting will be "The Place of the Cross in the Christian Life."

Permit Sought For Cougar Dam

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Power Commission Monday was asked by the Eugene, Ore., Water Board for a preliminary permit for construction of Cougar Dam on the McKenzie River in Oregon.

The project has been endorsed by President Eisenhower as exemplifying the administration's "partnership policy" for multipurpose water developments, a spokesman for the board said.

The dam would be built, owned, and operated by the Corps of Engineers. The city of Eugene would design, construct, operate and own the power facilities. The city also would pay the government incremental costs for power in the dam proper and would share the costs of jointly used facilities.

Passes Bill to up The Dalles Dam Fund

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill by Rep. Homer Angell (R-Ore.) to increase by 16 million dollars the authorization for the Columbia River Basin project was approved by the House Monday and sent to the Senate.

125 Head Prize Guernseys Sold

PORTLAND (AP)—Rep. A. R. Bush (R-Pa.) has purchased a 125-head herd of Guernsey cattle from an Oregon breeder, it was disclosed here Monday.

A. C. Bush, son of the congressman, negotiated the purchase from M. C. Fleming of Troutdale. Neither party reported the price. However, a somewhat similar 130-head herd sold for \$500,000 in New York last year.

One of the cows sold is Fleming's Ivy Oaks Belle's Jingle, which holds the world record for producing more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat in each of four successive years.

Anna Laura Torrey, Dies at Lebanon

LEBANON—Mrs. Anna Laura Torrey, 81, a lifelong resident of Oregon who came to Lebanon a year ago from Portland, died Saturday at the Community hospital. She was born in LaGrande, Jan. 31, 1873. During the past year she lived in Lebanon with her son, Victor L. Torrey. Her husband, Fred, died in 1941.

Surviving are three sons, Victor of Lebanon; Orlando L. of Sutherlin and H. F. Torrey of New York City; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. She also leaves a sister, Mrs. John Thompson, Pendleton.

The funeral home arranged services for Tuesday afternoon from the Colonial mortuary in Portland. Burial was in the Rose City cemetery.

Brother of Admitted Forger Held for Jury

EUGENE (AP)—Richard Bailey had knowledge that forged bills of lading were being used to get loans from banks, his brother Alfred Bailey, testified in district court Monday.

The brothers, operators of the now bankrupt Bailey Lumber Co., are both charged with forgery. Alfred said he did the forging and then used the bills of lading to get loans. After the hearing, Richard was bound over to the grand jury. Alfred was bound over some time ago.

N. Marion Co. Lags In Red Cross Drive

WOODBURN—Cash received to date in the American Red Cross fund raising drive for the north Marion county area totals \$228.67 according to a report by Lloyd Froom, chairman, Monday. This is the final from all areas except from Brooks, North Howell and Silverton which have not reported and a small amount excepted from St. Paul. This is less than half of the quota of \$700.

Nesmith Ankeny, Cattleman, Dies

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP)—Nesmith Ankeny, 75, pioneer Pacific Northwest cattleman, banker and historian, died here Monday night after a brief illness.

A resident of Walla Walla since 1918, Ankeny was the last member of the family of the late Sen. and Mrs. Levi Ankeny of Walla Walla. He was in the cattle business near Washburn, Wash., in the early 1900s and later was assistant cashier of the First National Bank at Pendleton, Ore.

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
