Albany Autoists Find Pit Marks

ALBANY—Albany automobile owners began taking closer looks at their windshields and rear windows Tuesday and many found the mysterious "glass-pox" mark on front and rear glass.

In most instances the pitting occurred overnight, residents aver. The tiny pits "just weren't there before."

Those who have studied the strange happenings to their car glass agree that the pits are easily identifiable.

The agents of the "pox" have been studied in the Bureau of Mines electro-development laboratory here by Don Mortimore, head of the physics section. Mortimore said he had collected a number of the particles, and had viewed them under a microscope, but was unable to draw any new conclusion.

He agreed that the particles appear to be some sort of an ash, but said a good study of them was difficult because of their small size. When burned, the particles leave so small a weight mass that little is left to investigate, he noted.

Many of the agents will be repelled when touched by a lead pencil, but Mortimore said it could be caused by static electricity. He said he was unable to determine immediately how much metal was included in the particles.

A car dealer, who declined use of his name, said that he felt that cars left out-of-doors 24 hours a day are more susceptible to the glass pitting since they have longer to collect the destructive ash. He also said it was apparent

that windshields on cars parked overnight in a northern direction became more heavily pitted than did those parked east and west. The dealer also said one car owner, "very conscious of the appearance of his car, had found more than 30 pits on his windshield Tuesday.
