Pineapple Chiffon Pie
Ingredients: 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 1/4 cup water, 3 egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup pineapple juice (drained from canned crushed pineapple), 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoon lemon rind, 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk powder, 1/2 cup water, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 cup crushed pineapple (well drained), chilled graham cracker crumb crust.

Method: Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup water. Let stand 5 minutes. Put egg yolks, sugar and salt in top of double boiler; beat until well blended. Cook and stir constantly over hot, not boiling water until smooth. Combine pineapple juice, 1/2 cup water, and lemon rind. Gradually add to egg mixture. Continue to cook and stir constantly, until mixture has thickened slightly. Add gelatin; stir until dissolved. Remove from heat. Chill mixture just until it begins to set. Combine 1/2 cup water and lemon juice. Sprinkle nonfat dry milk over surface of water; beat with a rotary beater or electric mixer until stiff, about 5 to 10 minutes. Fold whipped nonfat dry milk and crushed pineapple into gelatin mixture. Pour into chilled crumb crust. Chill until firm, about 2 hours.

Note: A No. 2 can of crushed pineapple will yield enough fruit and syrup for this recipe, with some left over.
