Bidault Asks

The French minister said that it was evident North Korea had committed the aggression by suddenly penetrating the territory of its neighbor in armed force without previous recourse to any procedure of conciliation or arbitration and without any warning.

Bidault said he wanted to set forth two principles which the French delegation considers fundamental:

"1. No project on Korea's unification is conceivable if it does not include a real, effective guarantee that all representation of the Korean people within the common organs which might be instituted will be proportional to the numbers of citizens consulted in each part of the country.

"2. It will be extremely necessary, if these elections can be considered as valid, that the conditions of the freedom of ballot be verified, and attested by neutral observers endowed with sufficient powers of control."

Earlier, the 16 nations which fought under the United Nations flag in Korea were reported to have considered at a private session the question of winding up the Korean phase of the Geneva conference.

Top Diplomats Meet—Top diplomats of the 16 met for more than an hour to work out plans for how and when to write off this part of the conference as a failure. There was no immediate word as to whether they actually decided on a cutoff date. But informed Western sources said the 16 were generally agreed there was no possibility of a negotiated settlement with the Communists of the Korean problem at this time.

The Western leaders were understood to have decided that Russian opposition to any U. N. supervision of elections made it futile to offer a formal 16-nation proposal.

The tightly deadlocked Indochina talks were in recess Thursday while delegates awaited the outcome of the French political crisis, but there was no inclination yet to consider ending the Indochinese parley.

Eden Follows Bidault—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden followed Bidault in the Korean conference and outlined five basic principles which he said might serve as a basis for a settlement of the Korean problem.

His five points:

1. Elections should be held for the formation of an all-Korean government.

2. These elections should truly reflect the people's will, taking account of the distribution of the population between North and South.

3. They should be based on universal adult suffrage and the secret ballot. They should be held as soon as possible in conditions of genuine freedom.

4. They must be internationally supervised, and in the British view this supervision should be conducted under the auspices of the United Nations. This idea already has been rejected by the Communists.

5. Any plan for the settlement must provide the conditions in which foreign troops can be withdrawn. The mission of the United Nations forces is to establish peace and security in the area, and as soon as this has been achieved they will be withdrawn.

Peace Power

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Reminding that communism employs the tactics of conquest by division and sows fear and suspicion, setting peoples against each other, Wyman commented: "Surely the spirit of our Christian civilization can outmatch and overcome this slavery, based on ignorance and tyranny."

Saying that this nation had developed tools necessary to supplement the spirit of this country and was continuing to develop them, the general listed them as economic strength, natural resources, imagination and ability of scientists.

Build Around Weapons—He commented that this country must now build around weapons, rather than around men and reminded that the development of our weapons "keeps our organization in a constant state of development to give us the material power back of the spiritual power."

Wyman explained that in budget planning the Air Force needed to come first, because it would be the first to move in retaliation to enemy aggression, with the Navy in close support and the ground forces moving next. Here he mentioned the importance of civilian components of Armed Forces as an essential part of the Armed Forces because we cannot in peace time maintain a ground army of sufficient strength for war.

The general, who came to the Sixth Army assignment this year from that of Commander, Allied Land Forces, Southeastern Europe, with headquarters in Turkey, after talking of our Armed Forces commented:

Allies Aid—"Shoulder to shoulder with our own troops are the soldiers of our allies." then told of witnessing the growing together of the peoples of Turkey and Greece, countries that had been bitter enemies for centuries.

Remarking that these countries had joined not only in the defense for their own countries but with the "force of the free world to prevent surrender to the slavery of communism," Gen. Wyman reminded, "Communism imposes an enduring threat to our exercises of freedom and pursuit of happiness, the basic principle upon which our country was founded."

He urged that the struggle against it be waged on every front where our principles are challenged and pointed out that today there is little difference between men in uniform and "you, the civilian population in support of them," because all are dedicated to a common cause.

"Individually," he said, "we must meet the challenge with fortitude, calmness and unity of purpose. Collectively, our determination to preserve freedom must be more durable than the communist intent to overthrow it."

Wyman was introduced at the luncheon by Mayor Al Loucks, who also introduced Oregon's Gov. Paul Patterson.

As the general and the party

meeting him at the airport arrived at the armory they were played-in by the Air Force ROTC cadet band from Willamette University. There was also an honor guard composed of AFROTC Navy and Marines and a color guard of one each from the Navy, Marine Corps, National Guard, and Air Force.

The Willamette AFROTC band played during the luncheon and giving the invocation was Lt. M. L. Booth, USNR, reservist chaplain from Albany.

Oregon's adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, and Col. Aldred E. McKeeney, chief of the Oregon Military district, Vancouver Barracks, were those greeting Gen. Wyman when he arrived in Salem and were also among the guests at the speaker's table at the luncheon.

Thursday afternoon and evening equipment of the Armed Forces and of the civil defense are on exhibit in front of the Capitol building and Thursday night there is to be a military parade, starting at 7:45 o'clock.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Jenner (R-Ind) and McCarran (D-Nev) Thursday introduced a resolution to sever diplomatic relations with Russia and all other Communist countries.

The bishop heads the Methodist church for Southern California, Arizona and Hawaii. He came here to address a church conference.

Adams Denies

He said he met with Roy M. Cohn, chief counsel to McCarthy, and Francis P. Carr, staff director.

Jenkins brought up the matter by noting that Cohn had charged Adams once sketched a rough map of the United States, drew lines dividing it into nine zones, and asked that Cohn mark in the zones the area of the subcommittee's next proposed investigation of the Army. Cohn contends that Adams offered in exchange some "juicy" information about the Air Force, Navy and Defense Department personnel.

"I did draw such a map," Adams said, and did divide it. "I think into nine zones—I drew a grid like you play 'Cat and Rat' and it came out nine."

Adams said he drew the map "very casually" in about 15 seconds and attached little importance to it.

Later, Adams added, the Army found that the allegations of a homosexual problem at the southern Army base were not true.

Adams said the Army received the allegations in late November, and completed its investigation in mid-January.

The basic issue in the McCarthy-Army row is an Army charge that Sen. McCarthy and his aides exerted improper pressures for preferential treatment of a drafted aide, Pvt. G. David Schine, and a counter-charge that the Army tried to halt a McCarthy investigation of security risks at Ft. Monmouth, N. J.

The McCarthy camp charges also that the Army sought to use Schine as a "hostage" to stop the investigation.
