

Britains Ponder on How To Give Proper Cheers

LONDON — The Queen is coming home. Roger Bannister has just shattered the four-minute-mile barrier, and all sorts of events are going to call for organized cheering.

Sticklers for propriety, Britons far and wide are wondering whether all through the years they have been cheering correctly. The question being discussed: How many "hips" should precede "hurrah."

Some hold three, others think two hips more in keeping with traditions of restrained British behavior.

The forum, as usual, is the letters column of the London Times. The question of genteel practice on occasions calling for polite racket from the mob was raised by Miss Celia Burlison, head of the school of the Convent of the Sacred Heart at Tunbridge Wells. She wrote:

"On the day of the cup final match (football) I heard on the wireless the winning team call for cheers for Elizabeth the queen mother. He said 'hip-hip.' On the next day there was a broadcast from a ship which met Her Majesty the Queen on her way from Tobruk to Malta. The officer who called for the cheers said 'hip-hip-hip.' Which is correct?"

David Mackenzie of London advised Miss Burlison to stick to the shorter version—"easier to shout." An international twist was injected by Francois Lafitte of the Oxford and Cambridge club in the fall mail. He wrote:

"In France in my boyhood we always did it in triplicate: 'hip-hip-ouraaaaa.'"

Truck Sales Win \$19,000 Award

An award of \$19,000 was given Truck Sales and Service, 555 North Front street by a Marion county circuit court jury late Wednesday as the result of a suit against the state highway department. The case consumed almost three days with the plaintiff asking for damages of \$30,000 as the result of the construction of an overhead approach to the Marion street bridge from the east.

The suit is one of several filed by property owners involving the Marion and Center street bridges. Total amount sought by the various complaints is approximately \$300,000.

Turner Heirs Being Sought

CHICAGO — Children, grandchildren, or other relatives of the late William Turner and his wife, Catherine, nee Carroll, are being sought in Oregon, in order that they may claim a \$7,000 estate to which they are unknowingly the heirs.

This became known here today when Walter C. Cox, probate genealogist, 208 South La Salle St., Chicago, who specializes in tracing missing relatives to settle estates, took over the hunt with but few helpful clues.

"The estate was left," Mr. Cox said, "by a relative of the couple who died without issue, under which circumstances their children or grandchildren become their heirs, successively, with nieces and nephews next in line."

Search is being undertaken in Oregon because Mr. and Mrs. Turner are reported to have settled in the state in the first part of the century, after coming from Colorado where they also lived some years after their marriage in the 1870s in Iowa. "They are reported to have had two children who would be aged if living, but who are believed to have also settled in Oregon, where they may have married and reared families."

Drunk Driver Gets \$150 Fine at Albany

ALBANY — Two judgments against William Emmett Endicott have been received here by County Clerk R. M. Russell from Circuit Judge Pro-Tem William Crawford, the one based upon a jury verdict and the other upon a change of plea.

The one judgment requires that Endicott pay a \$100 fine to the city of Sweet Home by reason of his conviction by a jury last week on an appealed drunk driving charge. The other imposes a \$50 fine on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident to which Endicott had pleaded innocent in Sweet Home city court. In circuit court here he changed his plea to guilty.

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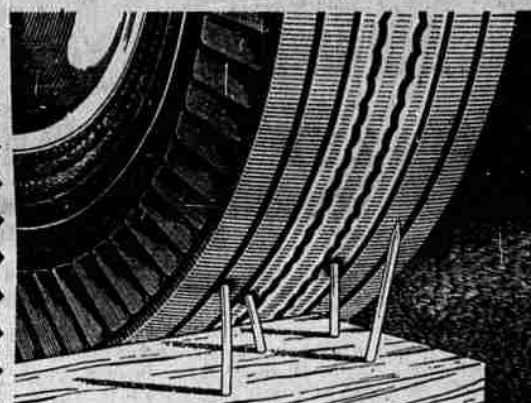
