14-Year Old Boy Wins National Spelling Bee

WASHINGTON (AP) — William Cashore, 14, of Center Square, Pa., who says he brushed up on spelling, whenever he could find the time, is the 1954 national spelling bee winner. To win the title, plus \$500 and a trophy, Cashore spelled down 56 other school children from throughout the nation in the 27th annual spelling bee Thursday. Runner-up was William Kelley, 11, of Deering, Mo. He tripped on "uncinated," spelling it with an "S" instead of a "C." The word means hooked, or bent at the end. Cashore spelled that word correctly and to catch the title spelled correctly one more, "transept."

Two Airlines Check Port Facilities Here

Representatives of both Northwest and Western Airlines were in Salem Thursday checking Salem's airport facilities to determine if Portland bound planes of the two airlines could be handled here in event that airport was endangered by rising flood waters. The trio, J. Powers of Western Airlines, and Bill Watson, chief radio operator for Northwest Airlines and C. Nelson also of that company, conferred with Airport Manager Charles Barclay and checked the aprons on the west side of the field and the facilities at the Administration Building. All of the airlines brought their Portland flights into Salem in 1948, when the airport there was under water. There is no certainty that the high waters will threaten the Portland airport this year and the critical stage is not expected until June 10-15.

Rites Held for Benedictine Nun

MT. ANGEL — Funeral services were held from the Convent Queen of Angels chapel here Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock for Sister Mary Wilhelmina Butsch, O.S.B., a Benedictine nun for almost 70 years, who died at the Convent Tuesday evening. The Rev. Sebastian Terhaar officiated at the Requiem High Mass. The Office of the Dead recited by the Sisters, preceded the funeral services. Interment was in the Convent cemetery. Sister Wilhelmina was born in Michawaka, Ind., Sept. 25, 1868, the daughter of one of Mount Angel's first pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Butsch, who came to Mount Angel in 1878. It was her father who encouraged the Benedictine Fathers and Sisters to locate here, and also donated lumber from his sawmill to build the first church in Mount Angel, in 1881, then called Fillmore. She entered the convent in 1884, and made her religious profession Dec. 15, 1885. Her assignments took her to the branch schools in Albany, Portland, and Oregon City at various times. Members of the immediate family all preceded Sister Wilhelmina in death, Sister Mary Agnes, O.S.B., and Father Joseph Butsch, a Josephite Father; also brothers John, Henry, Frank, Matthew and her deceased sister, the late Mrs. Jacob Berchtold. Survivors are two in-laws, Mrs. Frances Butsch, and Mayor Jacob Berchtold; a nephew, the Rev. Matthew Butsch, O.S.B. of Mt. Angel Abbey, and nephews and nieces living in this and the surrounding communities.

Crazed Marine Kills Children

JACKSONVILLE, N. C. (AP) — A Marine Corps captain slashed his three small children to death with a hatchet last night, wounded his wife and then, police reported, took his own life by jabbing a butcher knife into his throat. Coroner Talbert Jones of Onslow County identified the officer as Capt. Michael P. Carroll of Augusta, Ga. He was stationed at nearby Camp Lejeune. Jones said the youngest of the three children, Michael Philip Jr., about 4, was savagely beaten to death at the Carroll home on the outskirts of Jacksonville in an outburst of brutality that began about 9 p.m. Two daughters, Mary Katherine, 7, and Sara Beth, about 5, died shortly afterwards at the U. S. Naval Hospital. Mrs. Carroll, cut several times on the head, was described by hospital attendants as in a serious condition. Jones said no motive had been established for the slayings. Carroll attacked his family after the children had gone to bed—all were in night clothes—and apparently assaulted his wife first, the coroner reported.

Only a few head of choice to prime native spring lambs were to be had, these taking \$28.00 straight. Salable receipts were estimated at 4,000 hogs, 700 cattle, 200 calves and 1,000 sheep.

July oats and soybeans and all hard deliveries were exceptions. Brokers looked again at an overnight government announcement of selling surplus feed grains overseas at cutrate prices. After slipping a little at the start, the market advanced in general relief at the prospect of reducing burdensome supplies in government bins. Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 cents higher, July 96-96 1/2; corn was 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, July 71 1/4-71 1/2, and rye was unchanged to 1/4 higher, July 1.00 1/2. Soybeans were 7/8 cents lower (July) to 3/4 higher, July 3.50-3.51, and lard was 17 to 30 cents a hundred pounds lower, July 16.60.
