Scout Camp Registration Reported Near Finish

Registration for the summer season for the first three weeks at Camp Pioneer, Cascade Area Council's Boy Scout outing center in the upper Santiam area nearly completed, Kenneth Jury, camp director and district Boy Scout executive, announces. The camp will operate during the four week period, July 11-August 7.

Camp Pioneer is located in the Mt. Jefferson primitive area of the Willamette national forest at an elevation of 4600 feet. It is nine miles south of Marion Forks and seven miles off the North Santiam highway.

One of the camp's principal attractions is the five-day "Skyline Trek" for Explorer Scouts, 14 or over, which takes them to Pamela lake, Marion lake, six smaller lakes, Mount Jefferson and concludes at Breitenbush lake. This trip is made several times during the outing season. About one fourth of each day is devoted to fishing. District Executive Jim Kern will be the trail leader.

The majority of the boys who remain in camp will devote themselves to advancement programs, special instruction in boating, canoeing, swimming and life saving on the water front of the camp's own four and a half acre Pine lake. The water front program will be in charge of Dick Wyatt and two assistants who recently returned from Camp Meriwether where they took advanced instruction in water activities.

From July 15 to August 3 instruction will be given at the camp in forestry, wildlife and fish and game management by staff members of the state game commission. The boys will help stock large size fish in Pine lake.

Burt (Pop) Cray will be in charge of camp cooking. Food will be prepared in a new modern kitchen, equipped with steam dishwashing facilities, and is served in a dining hall.

New permanent eight-boy Adirondack type lean-tos are being erected in the eight smaller camp areas located around Pine lake to replace tents now used.

The camp is equipped with a shower house with hot and cold water; a large waterfront area with separate and protected areas for nonswimmers, beginners and swimmers as well as many rowboats and canoes.

Each boy must undergo a physical examination before going to camp from his family physician unless otherwise provided. Cherry City district (Salem) will have examinations at the YMCA at 7:30, July 8, 15, 22 and 29.

Each Scout's camp fee of \$15 only covers the operation of the camp and no attempt is made to realize a profit. Additional information may be obtained from the local Cascade Area Council office in the Ward building, 444 Center street.
