Dial Phones for Lyons District

LYONS—Dial telephones and a brand new numbering system will be introduced in this area soon under a \$26,000 expansion and improvement program recently launched by the Peoples Cooperative Telephone Company at Lyons, according to President Russell Wilson.

Change-over from the present magneto and assignment of the new telephone numbers, which will have an "UL" prefix followed by four numerals, will be on a progressive basis starting around Oct. 1 and completing in November.

Under the dial system, equipment to be installed in the new telephone building already constructed at Lyons will be fully automatic, permitting direct dialing of local calls without the assistance of an operator.

Long distance calls will be made by dialing a special code yet to be determined. These calls will be answered and completed by Pacific Telephone operators at switchboards in the Salem central office.

Change to telephone numbers requiring seven "pulls" on the dial, Wilson explained, is in line with uniform numbering system being established progressively throughout the country to permit nationwide dialing of intercity calls, first by operators and eventually by subscribers themselves.

Some 230 subscribers are expected to be connected to the central office equipment in Lyons at the time of the "cut-over" from the present magneto system in November. Wilson said the installation will cost around \$14,000 in addition to approximately \$12,000 already spent to completely rebuild the outside plant consisting of poles, wires and cables.

Quarters now occupied by the magento switchboard in the home of Mrs. Alex Bodeker will be used as a business office after the dial system goes into operation. Mrs. Bodeker will be on duty to accept payment of telephone bills and handle orders for service.

Wilson said, also that Wendell Weaver will continue with the company as a full-time repairman.

Mary's Peak Trek August 1

The annual Mary's Peak Trek, sponsored by the Shrine Clubs of Linn, Polk, Lincoln and Benton Counties, as one of the benefits for the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland, is dated for Sunday, August 1.

Percy Loecey of Corvallis is Trek manager. It is an all-day family outing at Mary's Peak, highest mountain in the coast range, which is in Siuslaw national forest.

A religious observance at 11:30 a.m. will begin Trek day. Lunch will be at noon. Barbecued sandwiches and soft drinks may be purchased at the Trek.

Trek location is just 27 miles west of Corvallis on the Philomath-Waldport highway. An air show, vaudeville acts, special acts for the children and Shrine musical groups will make up the 14-hour free entertainment show.

A total of 348 children were hospitalized at the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland last year.

The 348 patients were hospitalized for an average of 61 days. Three-hundred nineteen patients were operated upon. Casts were applied to 804 "kicks" and braces were applied to 425.

More than \$100,000 has been donated to the Shrine Hospital in Portland from profits of the last eight Treks. An awards distribution period will be at the Trek.

Clinic for x-ray work at the children's hospital took 3,053 negatives so deformed limbs could be viewed and casts or braces designed.

Some 3,079 patient visits were made at the out-patient department and another 8,360 patients were treated in the physiotherapy department.

In 1953, 281 children were admitted from Oregon, seven from Idaho, 43 from Washington, four from California, three Alaska, and 27 Canada.

On a diagnosis basis most of the cases, 67 of them were admitted for infantile paralysis. See

Cases Demand Another Judge

KLAMATH FALLS — Still another judge will have to be appointed for circuit court criminal cases here.

Defense attorneys in two separate cases Tuesday entered motions for the State Supreme Court to name a judge other than Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City. Court officials said the motions must be granted.

The State Supreme Court named Holman to sit in place of the regular judge, David R. Vandenberg, after Dist. Atty. Frank Alderson had asked that Vandenberg be replaced. Alderson and Vandenberg have had sharp differences for more than a year.

Holman was to have heard four criminal cases here. He still is expected to handle the other two.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Billy Graham, the American evangelist who preached to 2,500,000 persons on a five-month European tour, said on his return today that he felt "the golden hour of the church" is at hand.

Morse Blocks Priest Dam Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind.-Ore.) today blocked final congressional action on a bill to authorize local construction of the \$364-million Priest Rapids dam in Washington.

The bill previously passed by the House, was brought up in the Senate under a procedure requiring unanimous consent for passage.

Morse said the bill should not be passed without "full debate on the whole power policy of the administration."

His formal objection prevented Senate action for the time being. The bill would authorize the Grant county Wash., public utility district No. Two, or a group of districts or a state agency to apply for a Federal Power Commission license for the project, which now is authorized for federal construction.

Morse pointed out he presented amendments to the Senate Public Works Committee which handled the bill, including one to give preference to public agencies in distribution of power from the dam.

The amendments were rejected. Even if they were adopted, he said, he would still have objections to the bill.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said there should be "immediate action" on the bill. He said it should be passed and sent to a Senate-House conference where he would sponsor a public preference amendment.

CAYUSE CHIEF DIES
PENDLETON — Luke Cowapo, 69, a Cayuse Indian who for many years was co-chief at the Pendleton Round Up, died Monday after an illness of several months. Funeral services will be Thursday. His widow and three children survive.
