Radio Amateur Hours Sponsored by Stations

Talented amateurs in the state are going to have an opportunity to appear on radio amateur hours. Some stations are now getting started on their preliminaries to the Amateur Contest to be held in connection with the Oregon State Fair, September 4-11.

Part of the stations have already begun their programs and Salem's KSLM will hold its first preliminary contest from the stage of the Capitol theater the night of Thursday, July 15.

Finals for the contests will be held at the State Fair and here for the event will be Ted Mack of Television's Amateur Hour, who is being brought here by Helene Hughes as master of ceremonies for her Night Revue and will also work with Oregon's radio people. Mack has already announced on his show that he will be seeing people in Oregon.

The talent contest knows no age limits, the only requirement is talent, and through the contest the radio stations in Oregon hope to find much hidden talent.

Anyone within a "listening area" of a radio station participating in the contest may enter it. However, they may take part in the contest of only one station, if the "listening areas" overlap.

Persons in the "listening area" for KSLM can enter the contest by writing station KSLM or securing an entry blank at Stevens and Son, who will co-sponsor the contest locally with KSLM. The preliminaries will run over a seven week period.

To Put Curb On Jaywalkers

A campaign to curb jaywalking and walking against traffic lights by giving out tickets was initiated by city police Tuesday and one person was arrested Wednesday morning for crossing the street against the wait light.

"We were forced to resort to giving out tickets when other methods failed," Chief of Police Clyde Warren said. "A seven months educational program downtown through the use of loudspeakers, patrolmen and leaflets worked only as long as we kept the program operating," he said.

Facts About Forests



THE MOST TRAGIC FOREST FIRE IN AMERICAN HISTORY occurred at PESTIGO, MINN., OCTOBER 2, 1871. IT STARTED ON THE SAME DAY AND HOUR AS LARRY'S CO. WAS MOVED OVER A LANTERN TO SET CHARGES IN FLAMES. PESTIGO FOREST FIRE TOLL WAS 1,500 PEOPLE KILLED AND ONE AND ONE-QUARTER MILLION ACRES OF FORESTLAND BURNED.

2 Little Girls Calmly Admit They're Lost

For four hours Tuesday, police neighbors and friends searched for two small girls who wandered away from their homes on Portland Road.

Object of the search were Marilyn Jones; and Myrl Wood, 4. Four police cars, two police motorcycles, the first aid car and the Willamette Ambulance Service helped in the search for the girls.

The missing girls turned up about 8:30 in the evening when they walked up to Mrs. J. C. Perry at 825 North Summer street and Marilyn said: "We're lost."

A live bird was clutched in Marilyn's hand, causing police to speculate if the bird was responsible for luring the girls an estimated two miles from their homes.

Mrs. Perry, who heard about the search over a Salem radio station, immediately notified police as to their whereabouts. The two wanderers were then returned to their parents' homes at Fairground Cottages, 2397 Portland Road.
