Fine said he thinks the states should "take advantage of the President's offer" only after a conference of the governors in Washington this fall where "we can determine once and for all what is meant by it."

After Election Day
Gov. Knight, also a Republican, supported the conference proposal so long as the meeting is held after the November elections in which he is running.

But the Californian told his colleagues they are going to have to figure out how the states can take the gasoline tax away from the federal government and still build a system of interstate roads such as the President suggested.

Gov. Dan Thornton, Colorado Republican who is chairman of the conference, told a panel meeting of the White House staff, had authorized him to say that Eisenhower is asking the governors to come up with suggestions as to how to build the proposed system of highways.

Up to the States
Thornton said the President agrees the "primary responsibility" rests with the states.

Gov. Paul J. Patterson, Oregon Republican, told Fine he differs with him to this extent:

"I don't think we can solve the problem simply by repealing the gasoline tax. There are many things the federal government still would have to do. National defense use of the highways, for trucks, guns and so on, are a proper federal expense."

paid by comparable government agencies and private business firms for similar types of work, Spanier explained. He said it was intended to provide direct salary comparisons for a representative sample of key jobs in the state salary structure, and a basis for comparing the level of the state's salary structure as a whole, with the prevailing salary schedules of the government and private organizations surveyed.

Value to Legislators
This information, he said, should provide the basis of any pay adjustments to employees during the coming biennium, and members of the committee feel it will be of particular value to members of the legislature.

Spanier stressed that the study is not being conducted to examine and correct possible individual inequities in the classification of state employees or possible instances of inequality of pay for work of equal value.

Although a secondary objective of the study is to appraise the extent to which internal inequities exist in the state's salary set-up, Spanier said that detailed study of these matters has been deferred for future consideration.

Operating Steps Given
The consultants reported that the study will include the following board operating steps:

(a) Selection of a sample of jobs representative of the entire broad state salary structure. This sample will include jobs from all major occupational groups, many agencies and a majority of present salary levels.

(b) Conferences with heads of agencies in which sample jobs occur to insure job descriptions are accurate, current and sufficiently specific to insure adequate comparisons during the field survey work. During this step, job descriptions will be prepared for sample academic and police jobs and others not in the state's classified service.

(c) A direct contact survey of salaries paid sample jobs in selected counties, cities, Federal government, private institutions, and business organizations in Oregon and in neighboring states.

Tom McCall of Portland, executive secretary of the interim committee, was in Salem Tuesday working with the consultants in establishing field headquarters in Room 403, State Capitol.
