BISCUIT TORTONI
Ingredients: 10 coconut bar cookies, 1 cup cream, 1 cup milk, 2 teaspoons rum flavoring, one 4½-ounce package homogenized instant coconut cream pudding.
Method: Crush coconut bar cookies with a rolling pin. Whip cream. Pour milk and rum flavoring into mixing bowl; add pudding; beat until well mixed. Fold into cream. Spoon into 3-ounce paper soufflé cups, or other small paper cups. Sprinkle crumbs over top. Place in freezing compartment of refrigerator with control set for fast freezing, or in freezer. Freeze until firm, 2 to 3 hours. Makes 8 servings.

Priest Rapids Dam Bill Sent to White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Tuesday accepted Senate amendments to a bill giving Washington State local interests two years to begin construction of Priest Rapids Dam.

The legislation now goes to the White House.

The bill, one of several approaches to the administration's "partnership" concept of power development, would permit either Grant County, Wash., Public Utility District, a group of such districts or the Washington State Power Commission to ask the Federal Power Commission for a license to build the project. If the license is not obtained within two years federal authorization for construction

of the Columbia River power and flood control dam would be reinstated.

Under the bill, the local agency would pay the entire power cost—about 300 million. The federal government would pay flood control and navigation costs if it decides to undertake such work immediately. If not, the local agency would spend another 64 million to incorporate basic facilities for these purposes to which the government could add later.

The dam would have initial installed capacity of approximately 1,200,000 kilowatts and an ultimate capacity of approximately 1,500,000 kilowatts.

Outlook Dim for End Of Oregon Lumber Strike

Hope for an early end of the 23-day-old Pacific Northwest lumber strike was dim Tuesday after operators broke off the first major negotiations since the start of the walkout.

Two major employer groups—the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee and the Columbia Basin Sawmills—opened talks Monday with representatives of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union's Coast-Columbia district. But they promptly told the union and a federal mediator "we are unwilling to meet further until the union committee agrees to accept their original offer to renew contracts without change."

The employers, standing firm on their refusal to consider pay increases, said the contract renewal proposal is their "final offer."

The AFL union and CIO Woodworkers went on strike June 21 for a 12 1/2-cent hourly increase.

The employer committees said individual operators are "always willing" to meet with their crews to negotiate settlement with no wage increases.

In a public statement the employer groups charged the union with "bad faith bargaining."

They said their offer to renew contracts never had been submitted to union locals and that union officials had ordered out workers who voted against striking.

Kenneth Davis, secretary of the AFL union's northwestern council, replied that some employers are trying to "break the union." If such activities become serious, he warned, the union will extend the meier of Portland. Lt. Lange is a Navy pilot recently returned from six months in Japan.

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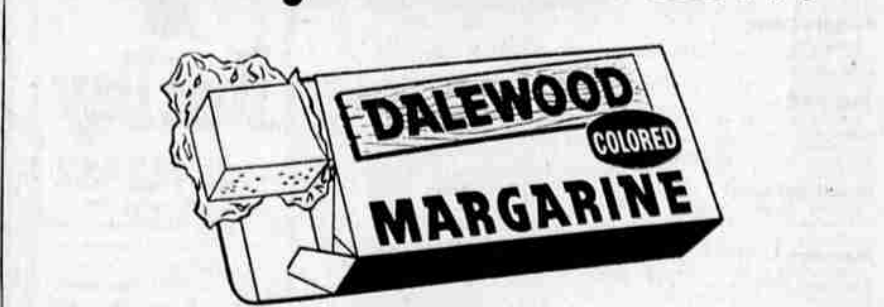
