

# Grid Giants Planning Scrimmage Saturday to End Their First Week

First scrimmage of the young New York Giant training camp has been set for Saturday afternoon tentatively to put Coach Jim Lee Howell's split-T plays to a test at McCulloch Stadium.

Such scrimmages, with their usual bone-bruising contact characteristic of the pros, are expected to draw hundreds of local fans who are watching the former college greats in their daily practices.

### Hit That Hole

The body contact began yesterday afternoon for the 52 squad members who will fight for 33 spots under the league limit. Howell and his assistant strategists, Vince Lombardi, put the Giants through some split-T plays to sharpen the quarterbacks on hitting quick opening holes.

"I don't care if you never get the handoff at first, but hit the hole!" Lombardi told the backs after some had spilled the football during the handoff and slowed down to retrieve it.

One of the highlights was the dummy blocking drill, first by the powerful linemen, then by the backs. Dummies in a circle were bowled over in rolling blocks as the Giants hit them with abandon in diving, cruching blows with shoulder and hip.

The 305-pound Earl Putnam of Arizona State handled himself with surprising agility.

Pass patterns found quarterbacks Arnie Galiffa, Don Heinrich and Bob Clatterback throwing them long, short and faking them on handoffs. Their tosses went to ends who "aried in height from 6-1 to 6-4, like the well-known Dick Wilkins of Oregon U., Bob Schneider of Bowling Green and Bill Stribling of Mississippi.

Still unreported here is Charlie Conerly, the former Mississippi All-American who was 12th in the NFL in passing last year.

Tuesday's practice was concluded at 4:45 with a series of wind sprints which had the Giants dragging somewhat en route to the showers. Kyle Rote, however, had energy enough for a little jogging after the others had left.

Practices will continue six days a week at 9:30 and 3. There is no charge to watch.

## Harness Racing Will Return to State Fair Track

Thoroughbreds and trotters will share the limelight at the Oregon State Fair as harness racing returns to Lone Oaks track for the first time since 1950, according to an announcement by Charles Evans, state fair superintendent of racing.

Presence of the fastest trotting horses in the northwest has been assured by the Northwest Horse association, Evans said. Also appearing will be leading campaigners from California tracks, including at least three Oregon stables which raced successfully

at the recent Bay Meadows meeting. Ten races will be staged daily except Sunday during the eight-day fair. The trotters will be featured in the first and third events. First post will be at 1:30 p.m. Fair dates are Sept. 4-11.

## Maureen Connally Thrown From Horse, Breaks Leg

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Tennis champion Maureen Connally, seriously injured when thrown against a moving cement truck while riding her horse, rested in a hospital here today.

"Little Ma's" injuries—a broken and severely cut right leg—will prevent her from defending her U.S. singles title at Forest Hills, N.Y., Aug. 23.

Dr. Bruce Kimball, who operated on her leg shortly after the accident yesterday, said the fibula or small bone below the knee was fractured and that some muscles were torn but not severed. She was in surgery more than three hours.

Her leg was put in a cast and Dr. Kimball said she would be hospitalized at least a week. He said, however, that the injury would not permanently cripple her. He ordered her not to touch a tennis racket for a month, and perhaps longer.

The 19-year-old tennis queen was riding her thoroughbred Colonel Merry-Boy yesterday, accompanied by two girl companions, when the accident occurred near Mission Valley polo grounds.

Before entering surgery, "Little Ma" said: "We were riding along Friar's Road. We stopped our horses as the truck approached."  
"Colonel Merry Boy shied and whirled into the truck. My leg was caught between my horse and the truck."

A financial report will be heard tonight at a second organizational meeting to discuss a new golf course and country club for Salem, set for 8 o'clock at the Marion hotel.
