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Traffic Deaths Cut One Percent

Oregon isn't having as much success as Washington and California in reducing traffic deaths. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported that during the first five months of this year, Oregon's traffic deaths were reduced only 1 per cent from the similar period of last year.

For the same period, the reductions in Washington and California were 21 and 16 per cent, respectively.

The number of injuries was reduced 21 per cent during those five months.

Search Made For Two Boys

Two 15-year-old Salem and Independence boys with a Huckleberry Finn urge are the objects of a current search by state police and forest service officials.

Larry Friesen, West Salem, and Benny York, Independence, were overheard in Independence Friday saying that they would like to ride the Skyline trail (the rugged trail along the crest of the Cascade range). At the time, they were purchasing a lantern, some rope, shells and camping equipment. They left on their horses and haven't been home since.

When worried parents contacted state police, they investigated and found that two boys answering the descriptions of the missing boys were seen Saturday at Mehama and Sunday at Elkhorn, about 17 miles northeast of Mehama.

Apparently they are going to try to ride the trail, police said. They have notified patrolmen and forest service workers to be on the lookout for them. Their parents want to get hold of them—literally.

Someone apparently with plenty of muscle made off with nearly a ton of scrap lead from a platform alongside the National Battery company plant, 575 Patterson street, Sunday night, city police were notified Monday.

The 1500 to 2000 pounds of lead was in seven small barrels, a company spokesman said. At an average weight of 200 to 300 lbs., it would take a pretty husky fellow to wrestle the things around. Even two or three men would find it enough of a job to make off with the stuff.

Floral, Garden Exhibits Joined

Floral exhibits and garden displays will be in one location for the first time at the 1954 garden and flower show of the Oregon state fair, September 4-11.

Potted and cut flowers, both amateur and professional will be under shelter built in the grove of oak trees west of the administration building. Daily flower arrangements and corsage making demonstrations are scheduled and intermittently during the day and evening there will be organ music.

The floral exhibits, like many other things at the fair, will carry out the Circus theme, with the various divisions having the Circus Day Dreams theme. The titles are Varieties Revue, nurseries, growers, professionals and landscape architects group, with 14 complete gardens; Center Ring Artists, commercial florists; Side Show Wonders, commercial growers; and Talent Performers, amateur growers.

Each of the garden clubs exhibiting will depict a song title under the general heading of "Strike Up the Band" and amateur arrangements will be grouped "Under the Big Top."

Amateur arrangements and garden clubs will present three completely different shows, one starting on each day, September 4, 6 and 9.

County Is Given Timber Figures

An estimate of the sustained yield capacity of timber lands in the upper watershed of the Little North Fork of the Santiam river has been made to the Marion County Court. The court asked for the information in an effort to determine what expenditures on roads leading to the area are practicable.

The state forestry department estimates there are 2,020,000 board feet of merchantable timber, owned by the U. S. forest service, private, state and O. and C. interests with a value of \$50,500,000 based on a rate of \$25 per thousand.

Of the total of 78,000 acres, the U. S. forest service owns 35,000, O. and C. 21,000, private 19,500 and state 2,500. While admitting that many impracticables enter

into an estimate of what the annual yield will be, the forestry department believes this annual yield will be 27,200 MBF, valued at \$408,000.

"The potential yield and income from the forest land are exceedingly difficult to predict, due to the variables involved," the report points out. "The yield of 350 board feet per acre per year as indicated in the tabulation is probably close to the minimum which might be expected and is based upon forestry conditions as we have found them in the past."

Recently the court met with representatives of several groups at the Lomker bridge above Mehama to hear requests for improvement of the Little North Fork road. The court wanted to determine the prospective tonnage out of the region before making a commitment.

Studies of the abundance of rabbits indicate that they reach peak numbers at intervals of about 8½ years.
