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Dallas Starts Dept. Merger

DALLAS — The Dallas city council this week took the first step to incorporate the city water system with other functions of the city government.

Unanimous approval was given Monday night to the first reading of an ordinance that would put the water measure on the ballot this fall.

Under the terms of the ordinance, the water commission would be eliminated and the management of the system would come under the direct control of the city council. Approval of the ordinance at the next reading is sufficient to put it on the ballot.

Greater economy and better coordination is the purpose of the proposed merger, councilmen declared. The council also elected the water commission members for their work, saying the move is no reflection on their work.

It was also reported that the water office may be merged with the city auditor's office, thus eliminating some clerical help. The commission has functioned as a separate body since the water system was purchased from private owners in 1931.

Present commission members are Chairman J. A. Inalls, Warren Hunter, Aaron Mercer, Maurice Dalton and Philip Hayter.

\$134,326 Asked for Auto-Train Wreck

ALBANY—Alma F. Carlson, co-proprietor with her husband, Victor J. Carlson, of Linn county service stations, has filed suit in circuit court against the Southern Pacific Co., and H. W. Wilson, train engineer, for \$134,326.47, alleging disabling injuries suffered in a collision between the Carlson automobile and a log train at Griggs station Oct. 9, 1953.

In her complaint Mrs. Carlson sets forth that she and her husband were proceeding from Lebanon toward Scio when the accident happened. Mr. Carlson was driving.

Mrs. Carlson alleges that the railroad crossing near the plywood plant was inadequately lighted and that Engineer Wilson failed to sound the siren or blow the whistle with which the train was equipped, to warn the motorists. After the accident, the complaint recites, a system of electric lights was installed. Mrs. Carlson further alleges that it was impossible to see the train in time to avoid the accident and that when the crash came her body was jammed between the seat and the dashboard. Mrs. Carlson recites that she has suffered permanent injuries.

Reginald Parker of Salem, professor of law at Willamette University, was presented as guest speaker by Irving D. Brown, program chairman, at the Woodburn Rotary club Thursday noon. He spoke of the 5th amendment to the federal constitution as it applies to the congressional investigations.

The remaining two years of the unexpired term of Councilman Max McGlasson, who recently resigned to move to La Grande, will be filled by appointment by the mayor.

City offices require 25 names of registered voters on the petition blanks. The forms may be secured at the auditor's office. All councilmen are elected from the city at large.

ALBANY — Bringing back loot valued at \$715 taken two weeks ago from the City Dr. Cleaning establishment at Sweet Home, Sheriff George K. Miller, Roy Clovers, Sweet Home chief of police, and F. L. Bank Deposits Drop In Linn County

ALBANY — Bank deposits throughout Linn county slid off by \$1,716,947.41 under the corresponding call period of last year, it became known Friday when computation of comparison between figures for June 30, 1954, and June 30, 1953, were completed.

Total of deposits on hand in the 13 Linn county banks June 30, was \$41,817,307.07 in comparison with \$43,534,254.48 when June 30, 1953, report was made.

Furthermore, loans eased down by \$3,153,664.44 under the 1953 June 30 figure to a total of \$24,355,829.89, according to the reports of Linn county's 11 lending institutions.
