Adm. Bledsoe Coming Here

Rear Adm. Albert MacQueen Bledsoe, USN, who since the first part of this year has been commandant of the 13th Naval District, will pay a visit to Salem next Thursday.

The admiral is making the trip to visit the local Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training center, and Salem Organized Naval Reserve Surface division and the local recruiting office, but also plans brief visits with state and city officials and a tour of the city.

Present plans call for Adm. Bledsoe to arrive in the afternoon at the Naval Air Reserve Facility, where the Marine Corps will have an honor guard and the Navy six side boys to greet him on his arrival. He will inspect the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training center and when the surface division meets in the evening inspect the outfit and visit the classes.

Capt. O. G. Kirk, reserve coordinator, will be with Adm. Bledsoe, as will his aide Lt. Cmdr. R. N. Pearce. Also expected to be in the visiting group are Cmdr. Howard Duff, assistant reserve coordinator, and Cmdr. W. L. Kiley, district public information officer.

NEW CABINET IN FINLAND

New Officer At Facility

Arriving in Salem Wednesday was Lt. John Neal Bryant, who next week takes over his duties as the officer in charge of the facility since January, 1953. Thornton goes to duty at the St. Louis, Mo., Naval Air Station.

Bryant comes to the Salem assignment from duty as the officer in charge of an airborne early warning and anti-submarine unit with Composite Squadron 11 at North Island, San Diego, Calif. In July of this year he returned from the Far East aboard the Essex after being out for seven and half months with Task Force 77, attached to Air Task Group Two on the Essex.

Prior to the assignment he had when transferred to Salem the Naval commander was on the USS Kenneth Whiting as CIC officer from September, 1951, until November, 1952. During that time he was in Korean waters aboard ship.

A veteran of service in World War II, serving from April, 1942, until January, 1946, with the Navy, Cdr. Bryant returned to active duty with the Navy three and a half years ago. During the time that he was on inactive duty he was a furniture manufacturer in his native state of Texas.

Coming to Salem with the new officer in charge of the Salem Naval Air Reserve Facility were his wife and their 10-year-old daughter, Pamela.

Auditions Held For ROTC Chorus

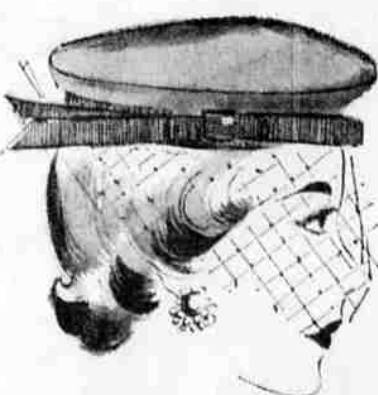
