Cardinal Jorio Dies in Vatican

VATICAN CITY (UP)—Domenico Cardinal Jorio, 87, died today of a heart attack, creating fourth vacancy in the Sacred College of Cardinals.

Jorio collapsed and died at 12:15 p.m. (3:15 a.m. PST) in his apartment in the holy office of the Vatican.

He was the second cardinal to die this month. Francesco Cardinal Borgognini Duca 70, died of a heart attack in his home in Rome on Oct. 4.

Jorio's death reduced the College of Cardinals to 66 members, four short of the full strength of 70 to which Pope Pius XII raised it in January, 1953, for the first time in 250 years.

There now are 44 non-Italian Cardinals and 22 Italians, a record low among the Italians who for centuries dominated the college.

Newport Has 2 Inches of Rain

PORTLAND — A rain storm moved across Western Oregon's north section Wednesday night and early Thursday, dumping more than two inches on Newport.

Portland's downtown weather station reported 1.02 inches in the 24 hours to 4:30 a. m.—and it was still raining. But at the Portland airport, the total was only .53 of an inch.

Salem reported .65 of an inch but southward the rain tapered off to .11 at Eugene and none at all at Roseburg.

A number of reporting stations on the western slopes of the Cascades told of an inch or more of rain and the same was true across the valley on the eastern edge of the Coast Range.

The Weather Bureau said the rain came from one of a series of storms moving in from the mid-Pacific.

School Bus Smashes Pickup

EDGEFIELD, S. C. — A school bus smashed into a pickup truck and careened down a 25-foot embankment near here Thursday, injuring at least 14 pupils and one woman.

Sheriff C. R. Jackson said the accident occurred 14 miles west of here while the bus was bringing the pupils to the Edgefield schools. Jackson said the bus either passed a couple of pupils or they were late at their pickup point. The mother of one of them, Mrs. Alice White, drove after the bus with the children in a pickup truck, passed the bus and then apparently stopped suddenly, he reported.

The bus plowed into the rear of the pickup, crushing it against an embankment, then continued out of control down a steep fill and into the end of a concrete culvert pipe.

PORTLAND — Morris Christlanson, 35, Aloha, Ore., died in a hospital here Wednesday from burns suffered when molten carbide spilled on him in a Portland factory Tuesday.

Walnut Fire Damages Residence at Albany

ALBANY — Extensive smoke and heat damage was done to the Matthew Tudor home, 420 E. Queen Ave., today when walnuts being dried over a wood furnace caught fire, the city fire department said.

According to the department reports, Mrs. Tudor said the walnuts were on a grate above the furnace. The blaze charred nearby walls and smoke blackened the rest of one room before firemen arrived on the scene.

The house is owned by James Stalcup.

Seek to Build Dam in Canada

PORTLAND — A combine of Puget Sound utilities wants to build a 250-million-dollar dam in British Columbia in order to get the downstream benefits.

The proposal was laid before the Bonneville Administration here Wednesday. The combine, known as the Puget Sound Utilities Council, explained the dam and the power rights at the dam site would belong to British Columbia, but downstream benefits would make the investment worthwhile.

The dam would be built on Mica Creek, above Revelstoke, B. C., some 200 miles north of the U. S.-Canadian border. It would be a rock-fill structure, 700 feet high, which would make it the highest of its type in the world, said Jack D. Stevens, consulting engineer of the council.

Seek to Change Lord's Prayer

PHILADELPHIA — Episcopalians from the Middle Atlantic area today considered a suggested change in the wording of the Lord's Prayer.

The proposal would change the phrase, "Lead us not into temptation," to read, "And let us not fall when tempted."

It was met with mixed reaction on the floor of the meeting of the 25th Synod of the Episcopal Province of Washington. Representatives of 13 Episcopal church dioceses are attending.

The new phrasing, introduced by Lt. Gen. John C. H. Lee of the Harrisburg, Pa., diocese, was sent to the resolutions committee for formulation and introduction at today's closing session.

Six Youths Held in Recent Burglary Case
