

Prisoner Dies In Albany Jail

ALBANY—John Peter Stokx, 49, 230 Ellsworth St., died of a heart ailment in the Albany city jail at 11:35 o'clock Tuesday night, it was reported by Deputy Coroner Walter Kropp.

The official said Stokx was booked at the city police station on a drunkenness charge at 5:20 a.m. Tuesday but otherwise appeared to be in good physical condition. He was reported, however, to have been drinking heavily during the last 10 days following his return from a week's visit to Medford.

Local physicians determined that death was due to natural causes after a post mortem examination.

A native of Marshall, Minn., born April 26, 1905, Stokx had resided here for the last 15 years engaging in the construction business. He was formerly employed by the Western Paving Co. He was a member of Albany Aerie No. 2255, Fraternal Order of Eagles, and of Local No. 1386, Construction and Laborers' Union, Corvallis.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Stokx of Gervais, two sisters, Mrs. Louise Dunn and another residing in California, and by three brothers in California.

Funeral arrangements will be announced.

Deer Hunter Dies of Wound

Arlan Young, 31, Lebanon, died Thursday in a Salem hospital of gunshot wounds, suffered last Sunday in a deer hunting accident.

Young was hunting in the Green mountain area southeast of Sweet Home when he was shot in the abdomen by Roy W. Rice of Lebanon who told state police he had mistaken Young for a deer.

Young's death brought to six the number of deer hunters to die in 1954 hunting accidents. Seven died of heart attacks and two were killed in automobile accidents while on hunting trips.
