HOME-FROM-SCHOOL LUNCH—Youngsters will like this spinach because it has plenty of cream sauce and a fresh flavor. Danish Spinach, Crisp Bacon, Stewed Egg Sandwich, Fruit and Cookies. Beverage.

DANISH SPINACH—Ingredients: One 10- or 11-ounce package frozen chopped spinach, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, nutmeg. Method: Allow spinach to thaw in refrigerator shell enough to break up easily. Stir butter and flour together in small bowl with a wooden spoon until completely blended. Place spinach in heavy saucepan (about 1 1/2 quarts) stir over moderate heat with long-handled fork until completely thawed and hot. Add milk; when milk is very hot add blended butter-flour, salt, pepper to taste, sugar and nutmeg; a little less than 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg will be right. Stir constantly until sauce is thickened and bubbly, allow to bubble a few minutes to cook flour well. Makes 4 servings—a generous 1/2 cup for each portion. . . .

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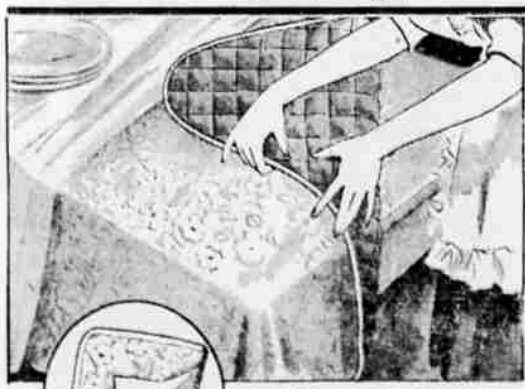
