SANTA AND THE MARS KING

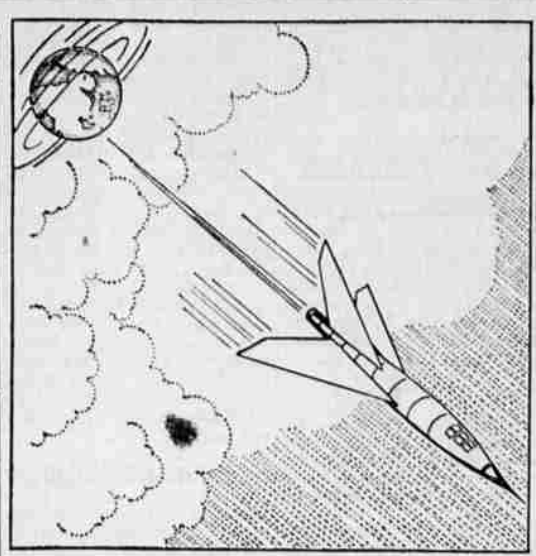

That is going to happen at 5 p.m. Christmas Day during the sixth annual "Christmas Hour of Story and Song" program on the CBS network.
The star, who was last seen on TV handing daggers to Macbeth (Maurice Evans) and urging him to have at the king, is going to read Hans Christian Andersen's "The Little Match Girl" and have a fine time doing it.
"I've been typed so long in the theater as a 'heavy' dramatic actress," she said, "that I look forward with delight to this new 'role.' Actually, I have had 'amateur' experience in this line, reading stories to my children."

Jackie Gleason's regular program falls on Christmas Day, and the comedian is going to play his poor soul role that evening—a poor soul whose life is made momentarily merrier by a trip through Christmas-land.
ABC is going to give "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" a full hour instead of the usual 15 minutes on Christmas Day beginning at 6 p.m. because of a special TV adaptation by Burr Tillstrom of "Many Moons," a fairy tale by James Thurber.

Army Rejects Crane Bids

WASHINGTON — Army Engineers have rejected all bids for a 30-ton gantry crane for use at The Dalles Dam on the Columbia River, Secretary of the Army Stevens said Monday.
In a letter to Sen. Kuchel (R-Calif.) Stevens said the action was taken because specifications "contained ambiguities and requirements which made full compliance difficult and uneconomical."
A German manufacturer, American Ligran Co., was low bidder on the crane with an offer of \$102,146. Universal Granehoist and Monorail Co. of San Francisco was second at \$133,627.
Kuchel had requested a review of the bidding after receipt of a protest that American firms could not compete with foreign countries where lower wages are paid.
