

Veterans Order Seeks Pensions

The national convention of Veterans of World War I held recently in Buffalo, N.Y., voted to have a bill for pensions of \$100 a month for all veterans of this war presented at the coming session of congress, Frank Young, commander of Salem Barracks, reported after returning from it.

The bill will prove that the pension reverts on death to the widow, and for free hospitalization without signing the so-called "pauper's oath," pensions for present widows of deceased veterans and other benefits similar to those already granted by congress to veterans of other wars.

Young reported that Salem Barracks has a membership of 412 with a goal of 500 by July 1, 1955. It is the largest barracks in the state and nation and has a large women's auxiliary.

The organization will hold a host dinner at the V.F.W. hall, 630 Hood street, Wednesday, December 22 at 6:30 p.m. followed by folk dancing, carols and later by dancing for members and friends. All veterans of the Willamette valley are welcome whether members or not, Young said.

Chrysler Sells 448,000 Cars

Detroit — L. L. Colbert, president of Chrysler Corp., said Tuesday that less than a month after introduction of the 1955 line of Chrysler cars 448,000 dealer orders had been received for the new vehicles.

Breaking down the orders Colbert said Plymouth had 248,000; Dodge 100,000; DeSoto 40,000 and Chrysler and Imperial 60,000.

The Chrysler president made his observations in a year-end statement. In it, he said:

"Before Chrysler Corp.'s 1955 models were introduced to the public, I said our immediate aim was to sell 20 per cent of the passenger car market and that when we hit that target we would raise our sights still higher. On the basis of the initial response of the public to our new models I now think we will raise our sights sooner than I anticipated."

Rye was weakest, never showing any strength. This was in contrast with the rest of the market, which moved ahead at the start and didn't fall back until after the first hour. A big rye acreage reported by the Agriculture Department, created selling in rye.

Liquidation of December contracts was a factor in unsettling wheat, corn and oats. December wheat, corn and oats, December contracts opened strong for the second straight day, falling back later. Sale of cash soybeans to Formosa helped beans in resisting the downward trend.
